

Dr. Sarazin Assists Fifth Grade Students With Bacteria Study

Jeff Ford's fifth grade class at Nyssa grade school has just completed a study on bacteria. The unit of instruction was highlighted by a visit from Dr. David Sarazin on Oct. 18, when he brought samples of bacteria and yeast growing on blood agar-agar.

Dr. Sarazin had each student examine a bacteria stain through a microscope. He also answered various questions that had been prepared in advance on points that were not discussed during the study.

The study came about due to a question, "Why do we wash our hands before eating?" The class grew bacteria cultures that were planted from a coin, pencils, fingernails, a fly, milk, open air and a sneeze.

After seeing the unpleasant-looking growths, the students un-animously agreed that washing hands before a meal was a wise procedure.

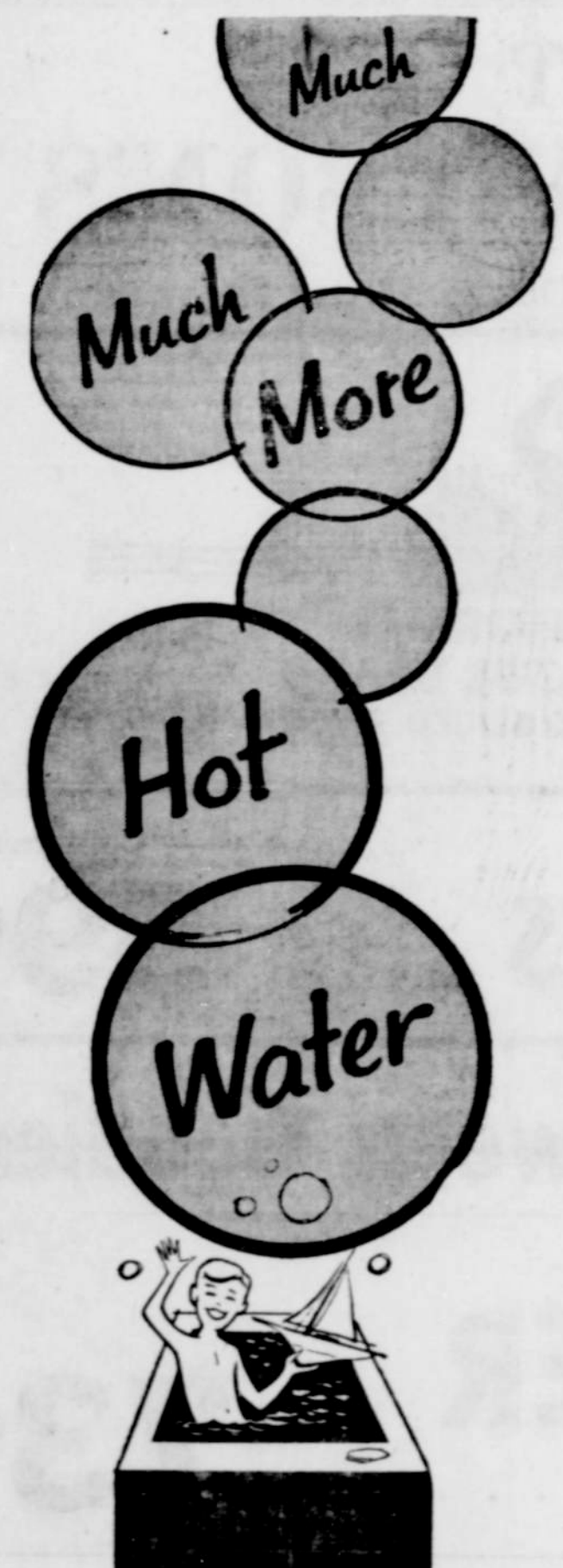
