Nyssa Chapel Rites Conducted Sunday For Ida M. Jennings

Funeral services for Mrs. Ida Mae Jennings were conducted at 2:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon, Nov. 12, 1961, at Lienkaemper chapel. The Rev. Ralph D. Maier of Caldwell First Christian church officiated.

Mrs. Jennings succumbed Thursday, Nov. 9, 1961, in Caldwell Memorial hospital, following a heart attack.

She was born June 27, 1887, in Oakland, Iowa, a daughter of William and Kathryn Duttweller Warren. She was united in marriage Dec. 22, 1915, to John William Jennings in Oakland. To this union were born seven children, three of whom died in infancy.

Shortly after their marriage, the couple moved to Kansas where they remained for approximately a year and a half. They then returned to Iowa and in March 1928 the family moved to Weiser, Idaho, and later farmed in the Weiser and Fruitland areas.

The Jennings moved in 1938 to a farm in the Buena Vista community southwest of Nyssa when the land first became irrigated under the Owyhee project. In 1946 they moved to Apple Valley and in 1953 they moved to Caldwell where they had since resided.

Mrs. Jennings was united in January 1902 with the Christian church in Oakland, Iowa, and later transferred her letter to the First Christian church in Caldwell where she was a member at the time of death.

She did needlecraft as a favorite hobby and many area residents will remember having received articles made by her artistic hands.

Mrs. Jennings had been in ill health for a number of years, suffering from diabetes. She entered Caldwell Memorial hospital Dec. 17, 1960, and two weeks later her right leg was amputated. Then in January of this year she was transferred to Horton's Nursing home in Nampa. In July 1961 she again entered the hospital for amputation of her left leg. After one week in the hospital she returned to the nursing home where she remained until the day of her death.

In addition to Mr. Jennings, she is survived by two sons, Earl of Nyssa and Elton of Fruitland; two daughters, Mrs. Geraldine Hendry of Glens Ferry, Idaho, and Mrs. Romaine Howard of Donald, Ore., and 14 grandchildren.

Other survivors include two brothers, J. W. Warren of Gray, Iowa, and Jesse N. Warren of Oakland, and one sister, Mrs. Sadie Bates, also of Oakland.

Her parents and one brother, Ed Warren, preceded her in death.

Interment was made in Nyssa cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home. Pallbearers were Bill Schoen, Ed Pruyn, Gilbert Holmes, Kenneth Reece, LaVern Cleaver and Charley McCoy.

Funeral services for William Frederick Findling will be conducted this morning at 10:30 o'clock at Lienkaemper chapel with the Rev. Paul Ludlow of Nyssa Methodist church officiating. He succumbed Saturday, Nov. 11, 1961, in Malheur Memorial nursing home following an extended illness.

Mr. Findling was born Jan. 4, 1888, in Beatrice, Neb. He was united in marriage Feb. 23, 1916, to Leva Mae Frost in Fairbury, Neb. The couple farmed in that state until they came to Nyssa in September 1936. Mr. Findling worked for the Reclamation bureau, Amalgamated Sugar company and did construction work in Nyssa prior to his retirement.

Mrs. Findling preceded him in death on Aug. 1 of this year.

Among survivors are two sons, Willis of Vale and Laurence of Salt Lake City; one daughter, Mrs. Verna Ruth Obendorf of Alicel, Ore.; 14 grandchildren and a number of nieces and nephews.
