### Sec. Appling Says Teachers Bound In Civic Affairs

Oregon teachers will "flunk the bonehead course in elementary citizenship" if they don't exercise their civic responsibilities and play an important part in public affairs, believes Howell Appling, Jr., Oregon secretary of state.

Appling told the more than 17,000 members of the Oregon Education association in a statement written expressly for them: "To believe that teachers are a separate and abstract segment of our community, isolated and insulated from the mainstream of public events and civic responsibilities, is to flunk the 'bonehead' course in elementary citizenship.

"By lesson and by example a teacher can exert a powerful influence on future citizens, and it seems to me if this lesson of community leadership is to be accurately taught it must be learned the hard way—in the civic arena. Through such active participation, the sphere of civic affairs becomes the classroom of democracy."

Members of OEA are conducting a statewide Crusade for Citizenship in cooperation with the National Education association to encourage teachers to participate in civic affairs and to practice as well as teach good citizenship.

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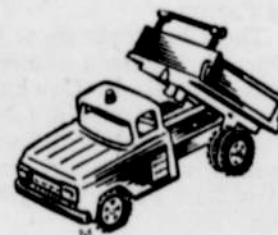
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
