Game Department Corrects Reports On Training Law

Oregon State Game commission this week issued a clarification concerning some misunderstandings of the hunter safety training law that will become effective Jan. 1, 1962.

Contrary to published reports, the certificate of competency in the safe handling of firearms does not have to be presented to obtain a hunting license nor does a person 18 years of age or older have to take the course of training. A person, 17 years of age or younger, is required to take the course of training regardless of whether or not he previously has been issued a hunting license.

Certificates issued by other states, provinces or the National Rifle association will satisfy requirements of the law.

The game commission also reminds hunters, 17 years of age or younger, that the certificate of competency must be carried with them whenever they are hunting with a firearm for any wild bird or animal, not just the game species. The only exception to this would be when a hunter in these age groups is hunting on his own land.

Courses of training are given by volunteer instructors in almost every community in the state. All prospective young hunters should avail themselves of the training as soon as possible.
