All Aliens Must Register Address During January

During the month of January, each alien in the United States, with few exceptions, is required to report his current address, according to Alfred J. Urbano, district director of the Immigration and Naturalization service.

Exceptions are diplomats of foreign countries, those accredited to certain international organizations and those who have entered temporarily as agricultural workers.

Forms for making the reports will be available at all post offices and at offices of the Immigration and Naturalization service. Aliens desiring information should get it at the offices of the latter-named organization.

Malheur Leads State Savings Bond Sales

It was announced this week by Joe Dyer, chairman of Malheur county Savings Bonds committee, that this county and Crook county in Central Oregon are first in the state to meet their 1961 Savings Bonds sales quotas.

Sales at the end of November in this county amounted to \$315,885, far in excess of the \$265,000 quota of E and H sales assigned for the present year.

"A lot of Malheur county residents have added to their personal security in 1961 through the purchase of Savings Bonds," said Dyer.

"At the same time, they have helped in a very substantial way in the solution of one of our country's major problems, which is how to finance the necessary increase in our defense ability without sowing the seeds for future inflation. This combination of increasing one's own security and at the same time increasing the security of the country we all love is a pretty wonderful thing," the chairman concluded.
