GIRL SCOUT TROOP 81 VISITS NURSING HOME

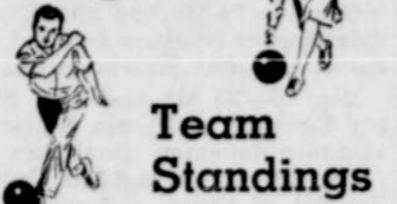
At recent meetings members of Girl Scout troop 81 made plans to visit Dec. 20 with residents in the nursing home wing of Malheur Memorial hospital.
