## State Health Board Urges Auto Owners To Use Safety Belts

In the interest of saving lives and reducing injury, the Oregon State Board of Health urges every car owner in the state to install and use safety seat belts.

Safety belts have been thoroughly tested and have already saved thousands of lives and reduced countless injuries. In any collision an automobile is stopped suddenly but the people inside, unless restrained in some way, still have movement and are hurled into the steering wheel, dashboard, windshield, or worse, out of the car.

Persons thrown from accident vehicles are five times more likely to be injured fatally than those who stay inside, according to a nationwide study.

Seat belts should be fastened at all times when the car is in motion. Contrary to some misguided notions, seat belts offer great protection even at moderate speeds. More than half of the accidents causing injury or death involve speeds of less than 40 miles per hour. Figures also show that three out of four traffic deaths occur within 25 miles of home.

Less than one percent of all injury-producing accidents involve fire or submersion. Seat belts greatly improve chances of surviving such an accident because it can increase possibilities of remaining conscious, so persons involved in accidents can get clear of a submerged or burning car.

A seat belt can be unfastened in an instant with one hand. Seat belts belong attached around each occupant when the car is in motion. This fact has been proven and supported by the Oregon Traffic Safety commission, Oregon State Police force and the Oregon State Board of Health.

The latter group said, "You owe it to yourself and your family to install and use safety seat belts. The board of health urges the head of every household to buy some protection by giving his family seat belts."

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## Atlas of Pacific Northwest Issued By Oregon State

A third edition of the widely used "Atlas of the Pacific Northwest" has been published by Oregon State University.

It is the only such reference on resources and development of the region. Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Western Montana are included.

The new atlas is considerably enlarged from the 1953 and 1957 editions. Ninety-seven specially drawn maps are included in the book's 10 major sections, all of which have been updated and expanded from earlier editions.

Dr. Richard M. Highsmith of the department of natural resources has been editor for all three editions of the atlas. Jon M. Leverenz of the same department is cartographer.

Twenty-six OSU faculty members contributed chapters for the new edition.

The 10 sections cover history and development of the region; the physical base—landforms, climate, water and soils; land resources, including forest and range resources; agriculture; the Pacific ocean and fisheries; minerals and energy resources; manufacturing; transportation and trade; recreation and subregions.

The atlas is published by the Oregon State University Press. Copies sell for \$5. All income goes for cost of printing and to support preparation of the next edition.
