"TV, The Big Picture" by Stan Opatowsky. A reporter's objective report on the television industry gives factual information and, with few exceptions, allows the reader to draw his own conclusions.

"Television and Our Schools" by Donald G. Tarbet. Material on the historical development and the role of educational television in the enrichment of the curriculum and describes its place in direct teaching, in-service teacher education, institutions of higher education and adult education.

"The Bible, Religion and the Public Schools" by Donald E. Boles. An objective, comprehensive study of the question of Bible reading and related religious practices in the U.S. public schools.

"The Twenty Billion Dollar Challenge" by Kenyon Scudder. A national program for delinquency prevention.

"Crime in America" edited by Herbert A. Bloch. A collection of pieces on capital punishment, probation and parole, the high cost of justice, the dilemma of American gambling and related topics.

"The Plainsmen of the Yellowstone" by Mark H. Brown. A history of the Yellowstone River basin.

"Citizen Hearst" by William A. Swanberg. A comprehensive, impartial biography of William Randolph Hearst, considered by many the foremost American journalist of the 20th century.

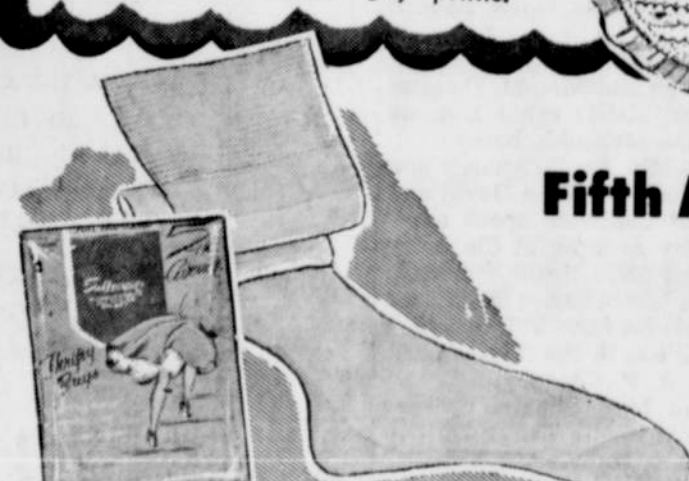

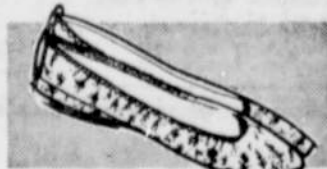
