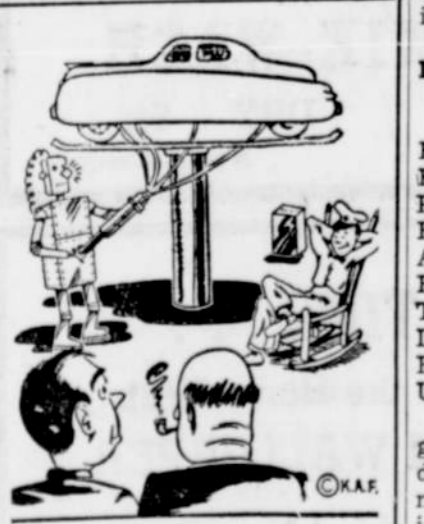

Seniors May Apply Now for Admission To OSU for Fall Term

High school seniors with good grades and with an eye on college may start the wheels rolling now to enter Oregon State university this fall.

Any high school student who has earned a B or better grade average through his junior year may apply now to enter OSU in September under a special "early honors admission" plan.

The plan was introduced last year and found wide favor with students and their parents who are anxious to make definite college plans in advance. Applications are processed quickly and students notified that a spot in "the freshman class has been reserved for you."

Some 900 students were granted early honors admission a year ago.

Application blanks for OSU admission are available from high school principal offices, Dallas Norton, director of admissions, pointed out. Students should fill out the blank, return it to the principal and request that it and confirmation of the high school record be sent to Oregon State.
