Bulletin Outlines Winter Weather For State Regions

Wondering when the last freezing day is likely to come in your area of Oregon this spring?

Or, looking further ahead, you may want to know how long to postpone harvest of frost-susceptible crops next fall—based on something more accurate than length of hair on the woolly caterpillar.

Detailed time-tables for expected low temperatures, both in the spring and fall for all regions of Oregon, are included in a new bulletin published by Oregon State university agricultural experiment station.

It is designed mainly for farmers, agricultural fieldmen and others whose business is affected by freezing and near-freezing temperatures and length of the frost-free growing season.

The bulletin makes it possible, for example, to determine your odds for catching freezing weather at a given date—one year in 10, one year in four, 50-50 chance and other probabilities.

Copies of the bulletin, titled "Estimating Dates for Low Temperatures in Oregon," may be obtained from local county extension agents or from the OSU bulletin clerk, Corvallis.

Weather information, much of it dating back to 1920, was collected from the U.S. Weather bureau, from unpublished records in the office of the state climatologist, Portland, and the records from OSU experiment station.

Three temperatures—24, 28 and 32 degrees—are charted for 102 weather stations throughout Oregon. In addition 36 and 40-degree temperatures are included for 33 stations where near-freezing weather is critical for certain crop production.

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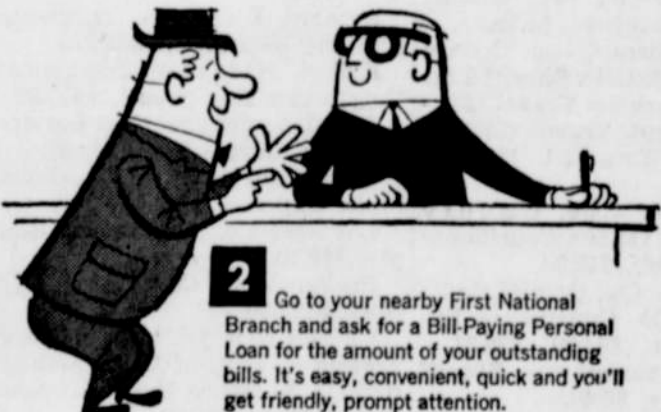
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
