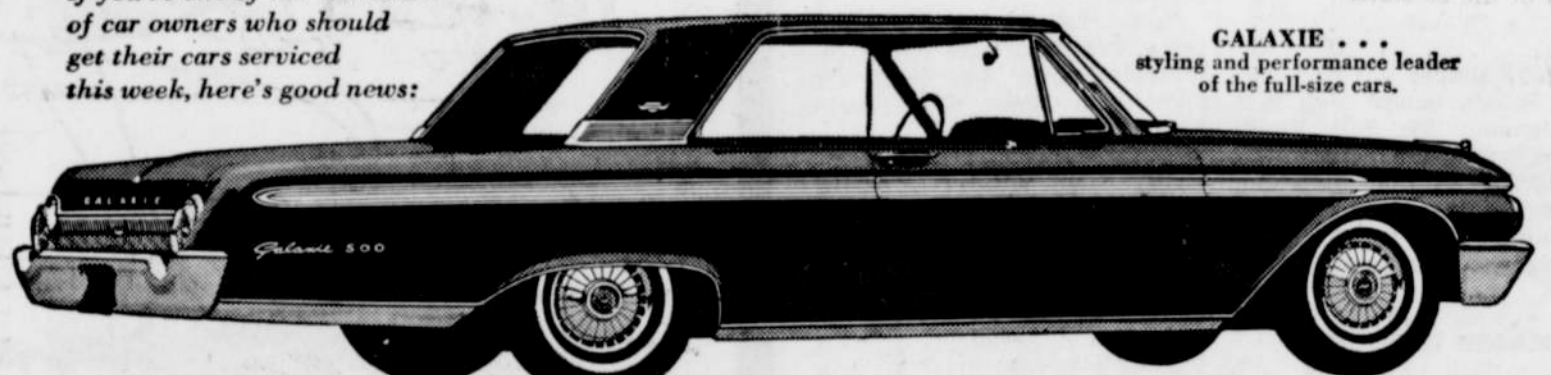
Margaret Lukaszewski has appeared with the Lyric opera for four seasons and has appeared with many orchestras in oratorios.
