

Ag School Studies Revamped by OSU To Meet New Needs

To keep abreast with the tremendous changes in agriculture, Oregon State university school of agriculture has revamped its instructional offerings.

The traditional 10 departmental majors of the past will be modified by three modernized options of study which will provide students with training needed to serve agriculture in years to come.

New options are (1) agricultural science, (2) agricultural business and (3) agricultural technology. All entering agriculture freshmen will follow the new program starting this fall.

The agricultural business option will meet the needs of students interested in marketing, sales and other business aspects of agriculture. For students intending to pursue specialized careers in research, teaching and extension, the agriculture science option is provided.

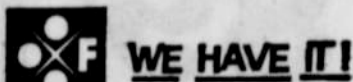
For students who wish a broad education in agriculture and who wish jobs in farming, teaching vocational agriculture, soil conservation and special positions with companies, the agricultural technology option may be chosen. Wilbur Cooney, associate dean in charge of agricultural instruction, said fundamentals of the physical and biological sciences would be given more emphasis under the new program.

Students in agriculture would be more thoroughly exposed to course work in humanities and social sciences and would be required to achieve higher results in English, writing and public speaking.

In addition, more emphasis would be given to business and management and more mathematics, including statistics, would be required.

Pressures for the new areas of study came from the continuing revolution in agriculture and the remarkable advances being made in the physical and biological sciences, Cooney said.

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Oregon Milk Picture Differs From U.S.; Record High Production Hurts Industry

Oregon dairymen ran counter to the national trend in 1961 by producing less milk while national production climbed to an all-time high of nearly 125 billion pounds, reports Stephen C. Marks, Oregon State university extension agricultural economist.

Oregon milk production last year, based on preliminary data, was 1,125,000,000 pounds, two percent less than 1960 and the lowest output since 1925 with the exception of 1959. Despite the lower production, the national upsurge of milk and dairy products hurt the state's dairy business, he noted. Nationally, milk production was up two billion pounds over 1960.

An even larger output is expected during 1962. This coupled with sharp reduction in consumer use of milk, has stirred industry interest in a new program for price stabilization on dairy products and caused national leaders to open a "Drink More Milk" campaign, Marks said.

At the same time, Marks reports widespread speculation that dairy price supports will remain unchanged if not reduced for the coming dairy year which begins April 1. The support price will be announced before then by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. At the request of industry leaders, Secretary Orville Freeman appointed a national stabilization advisory committee which, after its second meeting in January, made a series of recommendations with the goal of keeping both producer income and sales at a level equal to 1961.

The committee recommended that milk producers be given a chance to vote on a supply management program which would maintain producer incomes as an alternative to reduced dairy price supports. The objective would be to support milk prices as close to 90 percent of parity as possible.

Oregon Principals Slate Interviews With Grads at OSU

Oregon high school principals have been invited to Oregon State university Feb. 10 to participate in the 10th annual series of conferences with their recent graduates.

The conferences center around student appraisal of their high school preparation for college and reports on their progress and problems at OSU.

Oregon State started the interviews in 1952 to help spot and correct weaknesses in the college's orientation program designed to get new students "off on the right foot" and to help the high schools evaluate their college preparatory programs.

Conference findings and observations during the decade have prompted many significant improvements and changes in both the OSU orientation program and in high school programs, Dallas Norton, OSU personnel coordinator, observed.

Started on an eight-school experimental basis, the interviews found wide favor with high school leaders and the number of schools participating each year has increased steadily. Nearly 70 schools are expected to be represented this year, Norton said.

After the high school representatives complete their series of individual, voluntary interviews with their former students, they will meet with new President James H. Jensen and other OSU faculty members to review comments and recommendations made by the students.

The high school leaders will also be briefed on new courses and programs of study in the various schools.

Ore-Ida Announces Corn Price Increase

F. Nephi Grigg, president of Ore-Ida Foods, Inc., has announced that anticipated sales of frozen corn on the cob and frozen cut corn will permit a \$3 per ton price increase to growers. The total is now \$25 per ton, bulk delivered to the plant in Ontario.

With this increase, most growers feel that they will be able to put their best acreage into sweet corn because better land will produce not only a better product but a greater yield.

Ore-Ida plans to expand the sweet corn operation to meet growing demands. To Ore-Ida employees and growers this signals a longer corn run.

Contracts are now being signed for the 1962 sweet corn and potato crop. All indications point toward sufficient water and a good growing season, Grigg said.

J. Blaine Holladay, Ore-Ida's assistant general manager, has reported that local growers are working closely with Ore-Ida field department to produce a better raw product. He said, "Out of such close grower-processor cooperation we know that we can reduce jelly end, cracks and deformities in potatoes and produce longer, more uniform ears of corn, plus higher production per acre on both."

Educational meetings are being planned this winter to assist growers in producing more and better vegetables which Ore-Ida will process and distribute nationally.

OSU To Conduct U.S. Seed Crop Testing Research

Oregon State university has been selected for a national research project aimed at mechanizing laboratory procedures for testing the nation's \$400 million yearly seed crops.

Faster and more efficient seed separation—now largely a tedious hand operation—is the goal of the three-year research project with a \$60,000 grant from USDA Agricultural Marketing Service.

F. E. Price, OSU dean of agriculture, said the Oregon research will serve as a pilot study for seed testing laboratories operated by the seed industry, state and federal regulatory agencies, and experiment stations throughout the nation.

Laboratory tests are required for all interstate and foreign seed shipments and for establishing market value of seed lots.

Mechanized testing is expected to speed movement of seed from producing areas to domestic and world markets before planting time and to hold laboratory costs in line, stated OSU agricultural experiment station researchers who will head the project.

Other reasons cited for needed mechanization included the difficulty in obtaining seed analysts for seasonal testing work and health hazards in testing some types of seed coated with toxic materials for controlling diseases of seed.

Research will be conducted by OSU farm crops and agricultural engineering researchers with Jesse E. Hammond, OSU-USA agricultural engineer, as chief consultant.

Byron Mikkelsen of the agricultural engineering department will be assigned to engineering phases of the project, and Edward E. Hardin, seed technologist in charge of the OSU official seed testing laboratory, will conduct the seed technology phase of research.

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New Books at County Library Discuss Techniques in Drawing and Painting

Latest books going into circulation recently at Malheur county library include the following:

"Drawing the Human Figure in Action" by Arthur Zaidenberg. Most of the drawings in the volume are two-or-three-stage analyses of figures performing everyday actions — walking, running, kneeling, sitting, dancing, working, etc.

"New Encyclopedia of Drawing, Painting and the Graphic Arts" by Arthur Zaidenberg. Any technical problem which is likely to confront the beginning or advanced artist is dealt with. Included, also, is information about the methods and techniques of all major schools of art, ancient and modern.

"The Sign Painting Course" by E. C. Matthews. The author's aim is to teach commercial sign painting and sign building as it is being done today in leading shops all over the country.

"House Without a Roof" by Maurice Hindus. In another report on his native land the Russian-born American journalist describes conditions as he observed them in 1960, comparing them with what he saw on previous visits and what he remembers from his childhood.
