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Students Reminded Of Feb. 9 Deadline For Essay Entries

All 11th and 12th grade high school students were reminded this week by Oregon Veterans' Employment Representative J. R. Smurthwaite of the deadline for submission of entries in the President's Committee on Employment of the Physically Handicapped 1962 essay contest.

Deadline for submission of entries is Feb. 9 on the theme, "The Role of the Community in Employment of the Handicapped." Completed essays, which may be submitted by any 11th or 12th grade student in Oregon, should be sent to J. Richard Smurthwaite, 405 Labor and Industries Building, Salem 10, Oregon.

First prize Oregon winner will receive an expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C., and return, donated by the AFL-CIO, plus a \$270 scholarship award. Second through fifth place state winners will receive a \$180 scholarship award, a \$90 scholarship award, a \$50 and \$25 U.S. savings bond, in that order. All scholarship awards will be to Oregon universities or state colleges.

The state winner will be eligible for national prizes consisting of \$1000 first, \$400 second, \$300 third, \$200 fourth and \$100 fifth.

Students wishing to enter may obtain further information from their high school principals; local offices of the Oregon Department of Employment; Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, Salem; Veterans' Administration, Lincoln Building, Portland, or chairman of county committees for employment of the physically handicapped.

Cheryl Zesiger Attends Oregon 4-H Conference on Government in Capital

Cheryl Zesiger of Nyssa is among Oregon 4-H youths gathering in Salem today through Saturday for fifth annual Oregon 4-H club conference on "Know Your State Government."

Miss Zesiger, representing Malheur county, is a daughter of Mrs. Eugene Cleaver of route 2, Nyssa, and is a senior at Nyssa high school. She recently won a Betty Crocker Home-maker award. An article about the award, and also her photo, appear elsewhere in this issue of the Journal.

Pre-registration at the conference shows that 64 young people are attending, according to Burton Hutton, state 4-H leader at Oregon State university. All counties were invited to send two delegates—one boy and girl—at least 16 years of age.

Purpose of the conference is to provide the incentive for Oregon youths to become more interested and active in state and local government, Hutton explained. Multnomah, Lane, Hood River, Malheur and Jefferson counties have followed up the state government conference with sessions on understanding county government.
