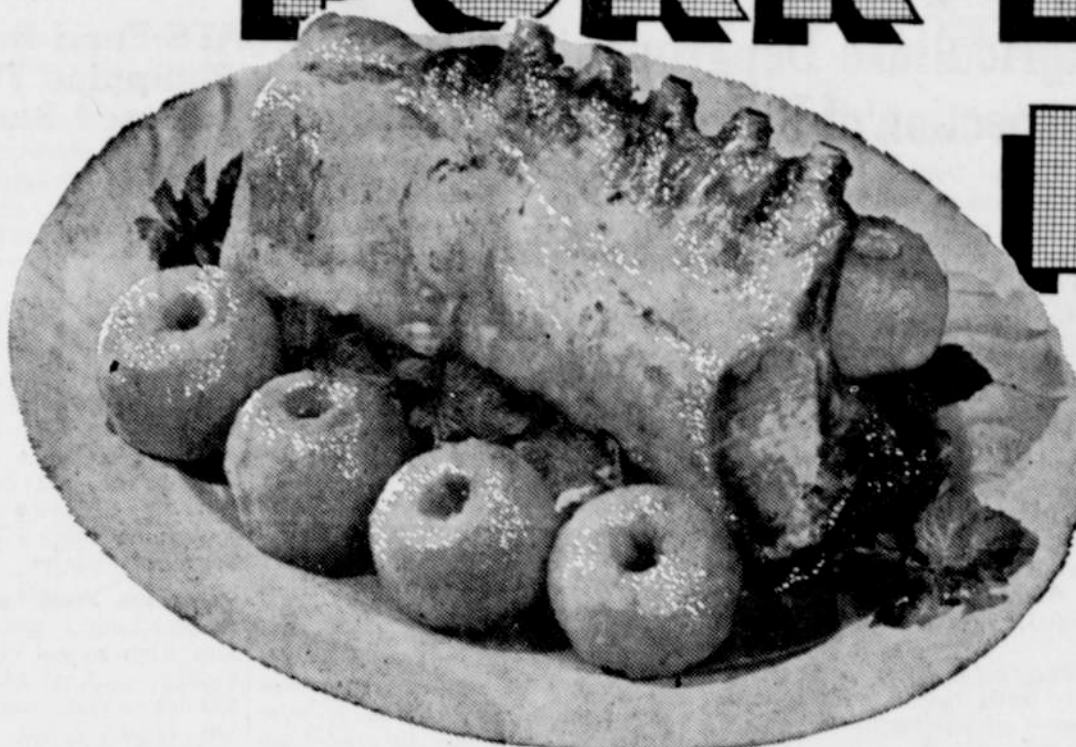
FENN ON FURLOUGH
