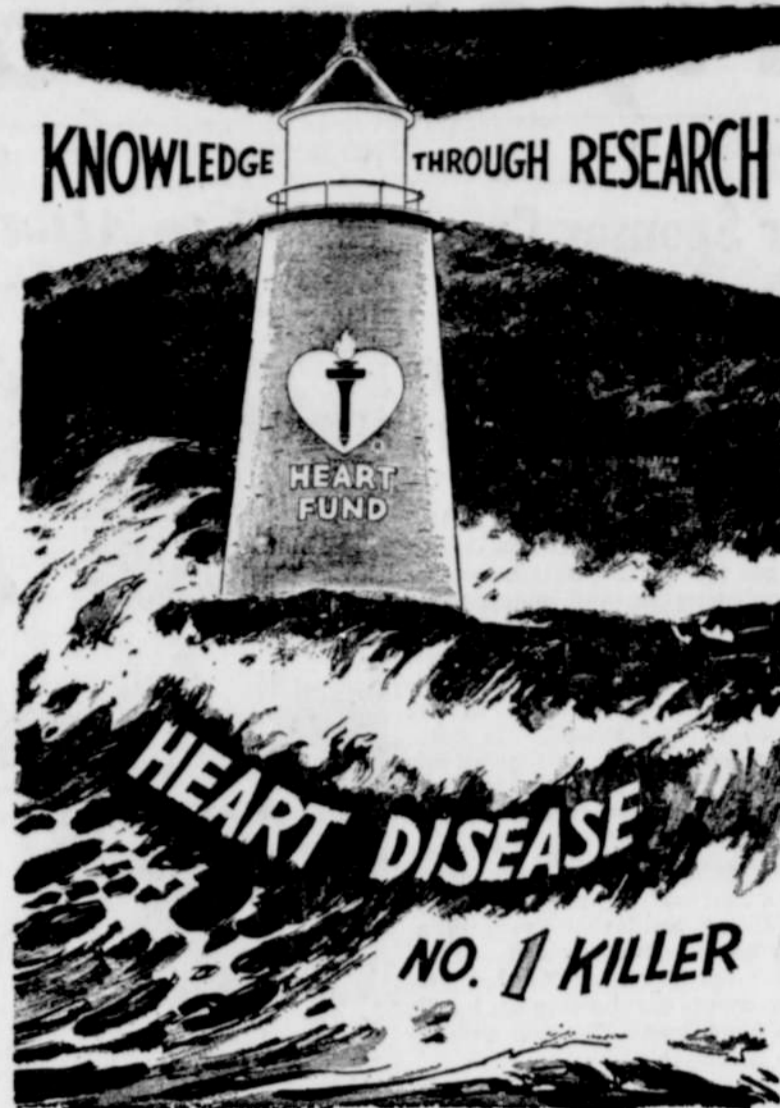
### ADRIAN CHURCH SCHEDULES SATURDAY EVENING DINNER
