Oregon Farm Bureau Head Declares
Kennedy Program 'Same Cure-All'

The President's farm message to congress was about as anticipated with no new innovations for solving the income problems of farmers, declared Wiley Clowers, Oregon Farm Bureau federation president, in a recent statement.

"The proposals put forth by the President are the same old 'cure-alls' of tighter government controls and a swollen government bureaucracy compounded with refined failures of the past," Clowers said.

"The suggestion that farmers

would have an opportunity to vote in a referendum on the proposals is a sham and farmers would have no choice. Either the farmer accepts the regimentation and controls of the program or he has his market destroyed by dumping of government surpluses on the market.

"Farm Bureau has always contended the farmer should not be charged with the responsibility of the accumulation of government surpluses by ill-conceived farm programs. Farm Bureau firmly believes these surpluses should be isolated from the market and should not be sold until the price is substantially above the support price.

"Farm Bureau's crop land retirement program is a sound, practical approach to the over-production problems. I hope congress will quickly dismiss the administration's proposal so they can get down to the business of considering Farm Bureau's program," the state president concluded.

OSU Professors
Use Television
To Teach Courses

Television has been accused of taking young people away from their studies but this year TV is being used to take two courses to students on a big scale at Oregon State university.

A total of 836 students are taking hygiene by television and 485 are enrolled in the TV general biology course.

And with a record enrollment of 9000 students this year, 1100 more than a year ago, the two big TV courses are helping OSU ease the teaching strain, university officials note. They help "spread" the professor.

Comments from students are favorable too and their scores on exams as good as those in non-TV sections. Ninety percent of the students in both classes indicated they would elect to take their lectures again by TV.

The biology course lectures also are taken by 60 students at Oregon college of education and by 14 selected high school seniors (for college credit) at Junction

City high school. The three-hour laboratory that accompanies the lectures is taught on a non-TV, regular small group basis.

Both courses can be seen by the general public, as well, because they are carried over KOAC-TV, channel 7, as part of the television classroom experimental program of the State System of Higher Education. Dr. C. L. Anderson teaches the hygiene course and Dr. Donald G. Humphrey, biology. Both also taught by TV last year though the student numbers were smaller.

This term's hygiene lectures by Anderson were video-taped last term and are simply being re-shown this quarter, freeing him to teach some other advanced courses this quarter. Nine classrooms are used with two television sets per room and about 20 to 25 students around each set.

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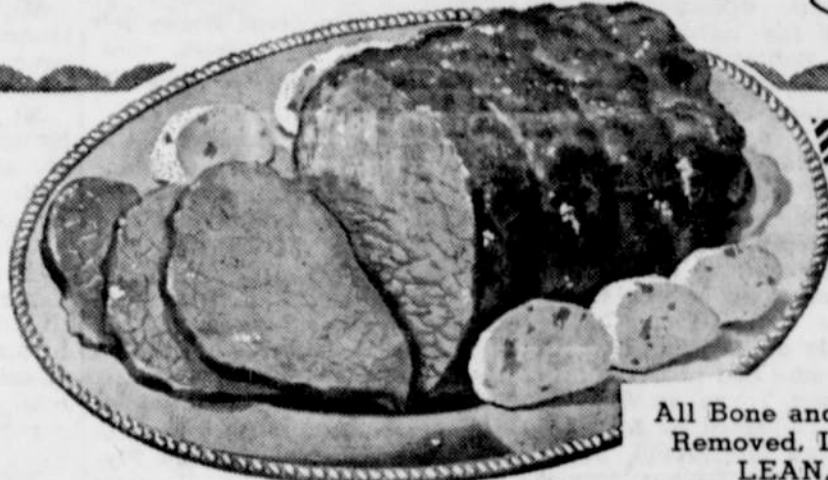
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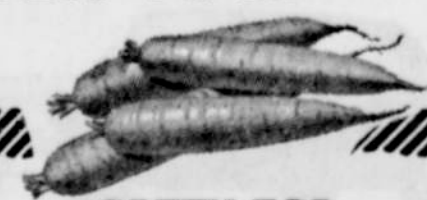
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
