the Harper-Westfall highway unit were built.

Also during that time, 12 miles of the Crowley road were rebuilt and five miles of it graveled. A total of 1,800 miles of various roads in the county was maintained. Several bridges were built at that time also—one on Owyhee river and three on Bully creek.

It was during Claude's term as commissioner that two new road districts were formed—District No. 4 at Juntura and Beulah and District No. 5 at Ironside.

"These are some of my qualifications for county commissioner again," Claude said. "I ask the support of the Malheur county voters on the basis of my honesty and fairness in dealing with all county business in all sections of the county. I will not authorize the expenditure of large sums of the taxpayers' money without a vote of the people."

He concluded, "In short, I will stand on my past record as a county commissioner."

Nyssa Chapel Rites Conducted Tuesday For Vernon M. Butler

Funeral services for Vernon Melvin Butler were conducted Tuesday, Feb. 27, 1962, at Lienkaemper chapel. The Rev. Howard Larson of Ontario Christian church officiated during the rites.

Mr. Butler, a Nyssa farmer, succumbed of a sudden heart attack Saturday, Feb. 24 at his home.

He was born Jan. 10, 1902, at Ontario, a son of Elbert, Jr., and Ada Glenn Butler and was a lifelong resident of Malheur county.

He attended Ontario schools and was graduated in 1925 from Oregon State college in Corvallis. While attending college, he was a member of Alpha Zeta agriculture honorary, Scabbard and Blade honorary military organization, Pershing Rifles team and served as president of Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity.

He also took ROTC training while in college and became a second lieutenant in that service organization.

Mr. Butler was a charter member of Malheur Fish and Game league which later became the Izaak Walton league. He was interested in wildlife and was instrumental in helping to establish valley quail in the area and in planting fish in Malheur county streams.

At the time of his death Mr. Butler was serving as wildlife member on the Bureau of Land Management advisory board for Malheur county.

In addition to his widow, Helen, he is survived by one son, Wallace who attends Eastern Oregon college in La Grande; two daughters, Margaret of Rainier, Ore., and Pauline of the home; his mother of Ontario.

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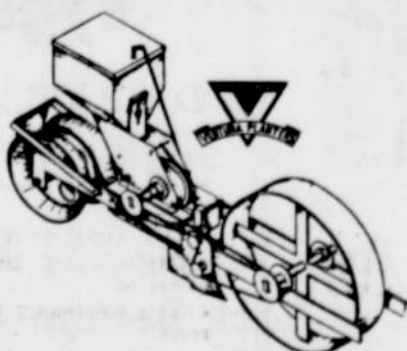
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
