

Fluid Milk Usage in Oregon Increases As National Trend Points Downward

While the nation is battling a three-billion-pound drop in milk consumption last year, Oregon can look at better than a 1.4-million-pound increase in fluid milk usage by its processing plants. The Oregon figure comes to light in a report just released by D. P. Shoup, chief auditor of the state department of agriculture milk audit section.

The auditors, operating in all processing plants of the state, found that 426,302,757 pounds of milk went into the bottle and can operations of the plants last year. This is the milk used for human consumption. In 1960 the comparable usage was 424,870,735 pounds.

This is not to say that Oregon doesn't have milk surpluses—and other problems. Right now the entire dairy industry is greatly concerned with reaching some accord on how to stabilize the market by the end of this year when the temporary law expires. This law is a market stabilizer to the extent that under it prices are established at the producer level only.

Audit Covers Fewer Plants

The milk audit reveals also that almost 6.4 million pounds more of milk were delivered to Oregon processing plants last year than in 1960. The audits covered 42 processing plants in 1961 and 45 in 1960.

Processing plants that have as their main line the distribution of milk for human consumption put 23.5 million more pounds of their surplus milk deliveries into sideline operations. In other words, into ice cream, cottage cheese, butter and cheddar cheese.

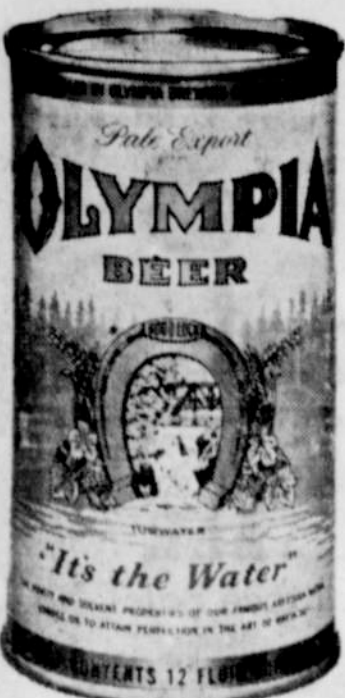
Next meeting will be March 13 at Connel Petterson's home. The meeting was adjourned and refreshments were served.

Guide to Cleaning Rugs, Upholstery Published by OSU

Is your rug showing effects of winter traffic? Does soil hide bright colors on upholstered furniture? If so, a spring cleanup may be in order.

Instructions for cleaning all kinds of rugs and upholstery pieces are given in a new Oregon State university extension circular.

Bernice Strawn, OSU home management and equipment specialist, offers step-by-step directions for cleaning rugs using a shampoo or a dry solvent. These methods apply to all kinds of rugs—cotton loop, Persian or hand-braided.

Oregonians spent a total of \$3 million last year on vacuum cleaners and floor polishers—very useful for cleaning furniture and rugs. Most polishers can be used to apply shampoo or an absorbent powder, the specialist notes. A vacuum cleaner must be used before and after cleaning.

Miss Strawn points out differences in cleaning methods for leather, plastic and fabric upholstery and precautions to take when cleaning foam rubber and urethane foam pieces.

The bulletin also contains handy first aid treatment for stains. Homemakers are warned not to use alkalis such as soda or ammonia in removing any stain. These can permanently damage wool.

Copies of the circular, "Longer Life for Your Rugs and Upholstery," are free on request at county extension offices or from the OSU bulletin clerk.

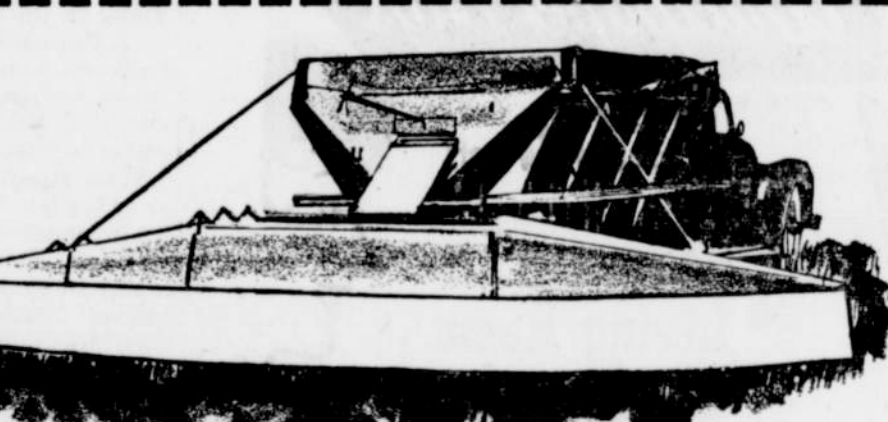

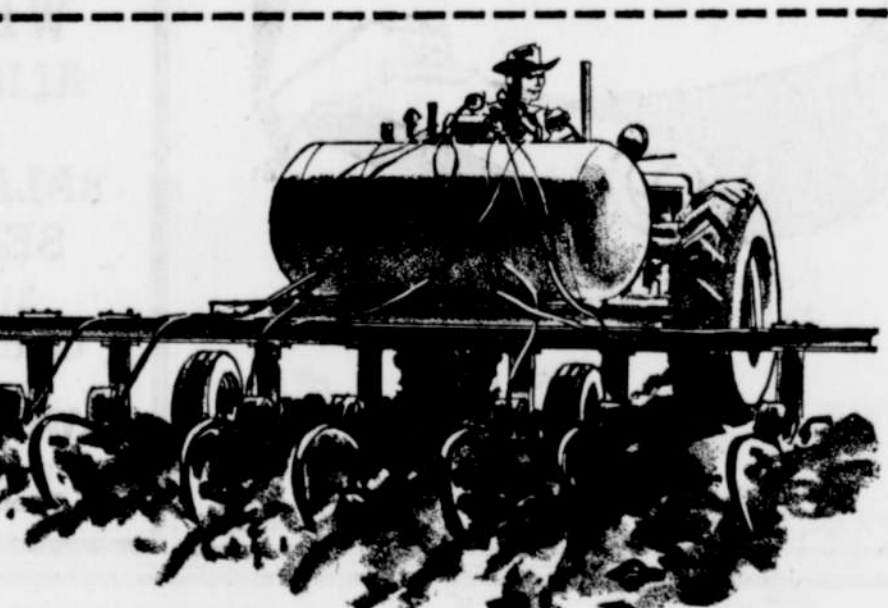
