Joffrey's rise to fame began with his enrollment in the school of American Ballet in New York City where he was auditioned for and became the only American soloist in the French Ballet de Paris. Due to his gift for teaching, he joined the faculty of New York City's School of Performing Arts and later established his own American ballet center.

Stages Many Dances
His career includes staging dances for "Oklahoma," "Call Me Madam," "The King and I" and others. Additional recognition was gained by staging entertainment for two years for the "April in Paris" ball at the Waldorf Astoria. He is the only American ever to choreograph for the distinguished English group, Ballet Rambert in London.

The result of these and many other accomplishments on the opera stage, on television and concert tours has been the formation of a large company with orchestra.

The highly gifted young artists in this company have all danced stellar roles in the New York City Ballet, Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo, American Ballet Theatre and New York City Opera Ballet.
