

Mary Alice Nihart Rites Held Monday

Funeral services for Mary Alice Shippee Nihart were conducted Monday afternoon, March 5, 1962, at Lienkaemper chapel. The Rev. Paul Ludlow of Nyssa Methodist church officiated during the rites.

Mrs. Nihart was born Oct. 3, 1871, in McConnell, Ill. She was united in marriage on Nov. 20, 1889, to James Nihart. They moved to Utah in 1900 and to Homedale, Idaho, in 1920. Mr. Nihart died in 1947. Mrs. Nihart remained at Homedale until December, 1959, when she came to Nyssa to reside with her daughter, Margery.

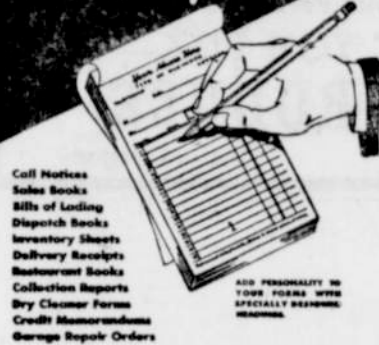
She had severe crippling arthritis for the past four years, then last January suffered a stroke. She succumbed Friday, March 2, 1962.

In addition to her daughter, Margery, survivors include a brother, Mahlon Shippee of Homedale; two grandsons, George Cole of Opportunity, Wash., and Jack Cole of Lake Oswego, Ore. Five great-grandchildren also survive. A daughter, Mary Cole, preceded her in death in 1952.

Interment was made in Wilder, Idaho, cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home.

New books going into circulation Saturday, March 10, at Malheur county library include the following volumes:

"The Harvesters" by Louisa R. Shotwell. A thorough, sympathetic study of the migrant worker in the United States.

"Treasures by the Millions" by Harry Edward Neal. The story of the Smithsonian Institution.

"Sahara" by George Gerster. A Swiss journalist's portrait of the Sahara, the world's largest desert, fills in details of its prehistory, folklore and legends, Moslem culture, modern politics, nomadic tribesmen and many other facets.

"Report from Berlin" by John Donner. A Finnish journalist, now a literary critic for a Swedish newspaper, reports on life in post-war Berlin against a background of its history and its current political and social problems.

"The Patriot Chiefs" by Alvin M. Josephy. An editor of "American Heritage" narrates the lives of nine outstanding Indian chiefs and their efforts to unite their tribes and preserve their land from the domination of the white man.

"Men of Fire" by Walter Russell Bowie. Biographies of 26 heroes of the Christian faith.

Funeral services were conducted Monday, Feb. 26, 1962, following his death on Feb. 22. He had visited on various occasions with his son and family in Nyssa.



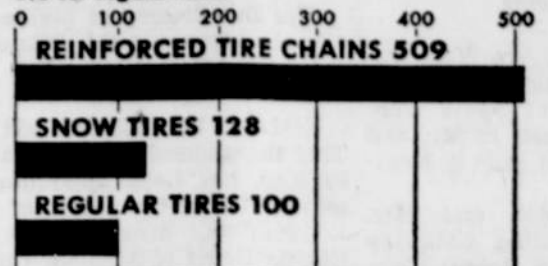
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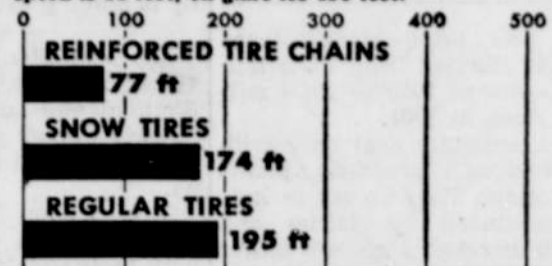
STARTING ABILITY ON ICE

Traction ratings, based on hundreds of tests, measure the pulling or hill-climbing ability of tires and chains on glare ice conditions. Index is expressed at 100 for regular tires.



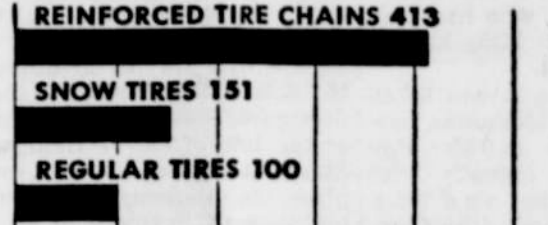
STOPPING ABILITY ON ICE

Average braking distances, based on tests from 20 MPH on glare ice. For comparison, average braking distance of regular tires on dry pavement at same speed is 21 feet, on glare ice 195 feet.



STARTING ABILITY ON SNOW

Traction ratings, based on draw bar pull tests on loosely packed snow, also indicate relative ability to pull through deep snow or climb hills.



STOPPING ABILITY ON SNOW

This shows the comparative stopping ability of regular and snow tires and reinforced tire chains on loosely packed snow, from 20 MPH.



STOPPING ABILITY ON DRY PAVEMENT

Above charts, provided by Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles, Traffic Safety Division, illustrate test results by National Safety Council's Committee on Winter Driving Hazards. For each "braking distance" above you must add 22 feet, which is distance traveled during average "reaction time" needed to think and get your foot on brake after seeing a reason to stop. Skidding and reduced visibility are the major added hazards of winter. Can you see and stop in time? Are your windshield wiper blades giving clear, streak-free visibility? Does your defroster work?

"Doctors, Patients and Health Insurance" by Herman M. Somers. The purpose of this volume is to contribute to public understanding.

"Nobody Knows My Name" by James Baldwin. Powerful first-person essays by the Negro author of "Notes of a Native Son" in which he deals astutely and candidly with the relationship between black and white and between the writer and society.

"Race and Science" by United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural organization. This study presents data on biological and anthropological aspects of race, origins of prejudices and antagonisms and effects of prejudices and antagonisms on social structures and on individuals.

"The Predicament of Democracy" by Edmund Cahn. The moral involvement and responsibilities of a citizen in a democratic society are lucidly explored by a professor of law at New York university.

"Official Secret" by Clayton Hutton. The story of escape aids used during World War II.

"Faces of Justice" by Sybille Bedford. Law courts and legal procedures in England, Germany, Switzerland, France and Austria are described and contrasted by an observant English writer who finds national characteristics as well as intellectual and emotional drama reflected in each courtroom.
