OSU Dean Cites
Trained Engineers
As Big U.S. Need

Engineering enrollments in the U. S. will have to increase 80 percent if the nation's needs for trained engineers are to be met during the next decade, says the dean of engineering at Oregon State university.

Demand for engineers has far exceeded the supply since 1947, Dean George W. Gleeson points out. National projections say the U. S. will need some 72,000 engineering graduates a year up to 1970, Gleeson noted. Last year the nation's engineering schools graduated 45,753.

Gleeson and other engineering leaders are concerned about the decline in engineering enrollment that started in 1958. Since then the number of engineering students in the U. S. has dropped 12.9 percent.

This fall the drop trend leveled off and on the Pacific coast a very small gain in engineering numbers was reported. OSU's engineering enrollment moved up from 1513 a year ago to 1553 last fall.

Though numbers have been going down, starting pay hasn't, the dean noted.

An engineering graduate this June will start at about \$535 a month with a bachelor's degree, \$615 with a master's and \$830 with a doctor's degree, the university engineer indicated.

More women are encouraged to consider engineering careers. Job opportunities for women engineers are excellent, Gleeson said. Women are particularly good at some specialized engineering jobs such as computer work, instrumentation, mathematics, technical librarians, etc.

One of the bright spots in the engineer picture, says Gleeson, is improved high school preparation. Students are coming to college much more ready to tackle engineering studies than before.

EvangelistNyssa-Adrian Churches Plan Study
For Merger of Three Denominations;
Combined Meetings Set During Lent

The Methodist and Episcopal churches of Nyssa and the Kingman Memorial Community (United Presbyterian) church of Adrian are planning a series of three Wednesday night meetings during Lent to consider the so-called "Blake Proposal," a move for the union of the Methodist, Presbyterian, Episcopal and United Church of Christ.

The proposal gets its name from its author, Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, stated clerk (secretary) of the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian church. Made to those churches included in the proposal and delivered as a sermon last year in San Francisco, the plan has subsequently received considerable nationwide publicity.

It reflects a current wide-spread movement among Christians of many denominations who are prayerfully looking at themselves, their particular church and wondering if it would be possible to unite again into one church.

Similar Merger in South India

This movement has been given an ambitious name; it is called the "ecumenical movement," the word ecumenical being a Greek word meaning "the whole inhabited world." A merger similar to the one which Dr. Blake has proposed has already come about in South India, and many Christians, like Dr. Blake, are wondering why such a merger could not also become a reality here.

The Blake Proposal is designed to deal fairly with some thorny problems which have hitherto kept the Methodist, Episcopal, Presbyterian and United Church of Christ apart. Most of these problems come in pairs: Should the church consider itself Reformed or Catholic (historic or universal)? Which should receive more stress, the word or the sacraments? Are the sacraments a means of grace or are they of a dedication-memorial nature?

Other Questions Considered

Should the church be autocratic or democratic? Should there be bishops? Shall the ministry be apostolic or charismatic (relying solely on individual spiritual gifts)? What will be the relation between scripture and tradition? Will the form of worship of necessity be unified?

Realizing the wide diversity of custom, thought and feeling among the churches included in the proposal, Dr. Blake has tried to hew the proposal down the middle of these problematic pairs, not in an effort to compromise, but to accept the best of both.

The proposal is, in Dr. Blake's words, toward a church unity which is "truly Catholic, truly Reformed, truly Evangelical."

Although the proposal was made to four specific churches, the invitation was left open to "any other churches which find that they can accept both the principles and plan . . ."

Proposal Considers Merging

The Presbyterian church adopted this invitation almost unanimously in May 1961. The Episcopal church accepted this invitation almost unanimously in September 1961. Indications are that both the Methodist and the United Church of Christ will do the same. The proposal is not to merge, but to consider merging.

Since such a merger will never come about until local congregations across the country are ready, the three local churches which are included in this proposal plan to treat it at a grassroots level. Each of the three congregations will act as host to the other two on successive Wednesday evenings.

They will worship in the manner of the host church and hear a guest preacher speak on that denomination's attitude toward the Blake Proposal. After the worship service, all will be invited to stay for coffee and discuss the proposal themselves.

Adrian First Host Church

Adrian Community church will be the first host church on Wednesday, March 21. Next meeting will be April 4 at the Episcopal church and the Methodist church will host the other two congregations in like manner on April 11.

Time for these meetings is set for 8 p.m. All and any interested people are invited.

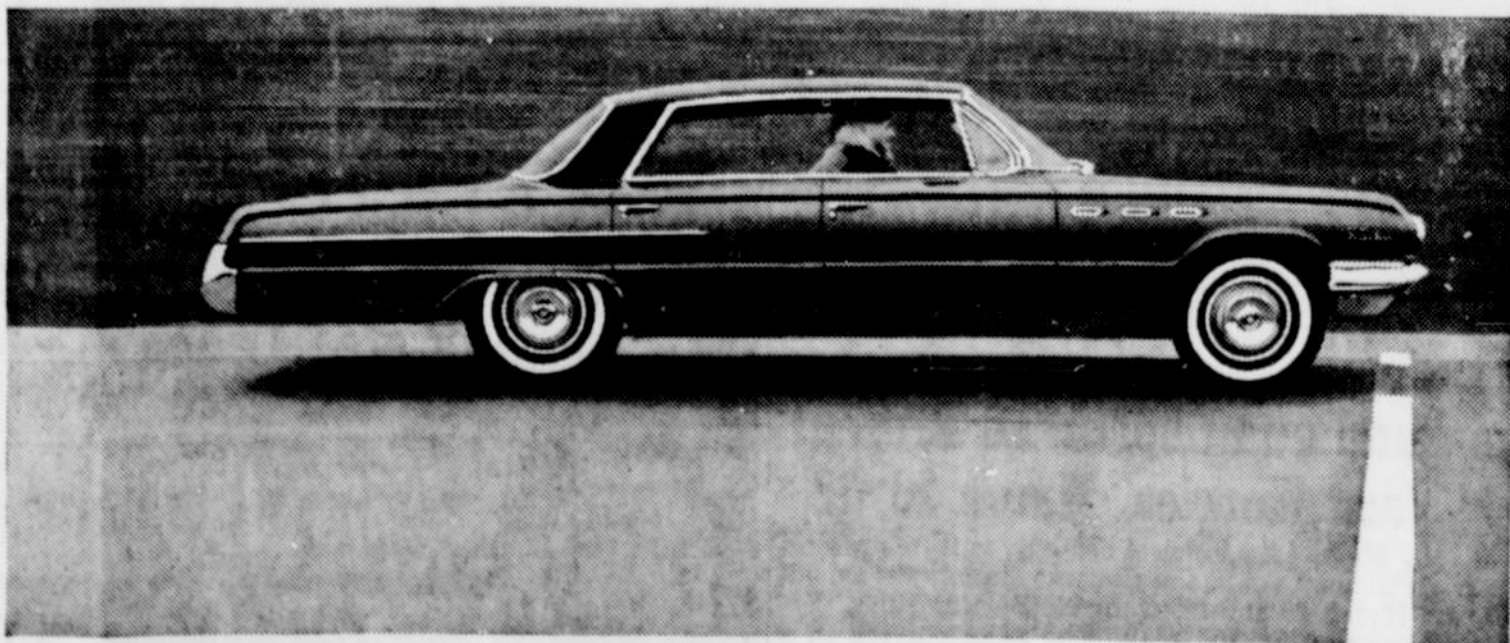
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
