

Correspondent From Paris To Speak At April 7 Knife and Fork Club Meet

Appearing at the Knife and Fork club meeting at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, April 7, at East Side cafe in Ontario will be Philip W. Whitcomb, veteran correspondent. He is said to be the best informed man in Europe on activities of that continent as they affect the social, political and economic structure of the U. S. He comes direct from Paris where he has been covering events of Europe for various American newspapers for over 30 years. He first went to that country in 1911 as a Rhodes scholar, one of the youngest ever to win that scholarship.

Following his term of study at Oxford, he began in August 1914 as European correspondent for Harpers Weekly; then followed an editorship for Foreign Trade Weekly, an assignment as European correspondent for the Boston Evening Transcript and acceptance of a similar position with the Associated Press.

Covers Riff War in Africa

In between these assignments he went to Africa as correspondent for London papers. In 1933 he sent them coverage of the Riff war.

Whitcomb was graduated with honors from Washburn university at Topeka, Kan., with the class of 1910. He was also an outstanding athlete. With his going to Oxford, also went his liking for sports; and he became a member of the Oxford rowing crew, played rugby and took part in boxing. He was in the heavyweight class and won an amateur championship in that division.

For the past 13 years, Whitcomb has been covering Europe for Machens, Inc. He has attended every DeGaulle conference, makes countless trips to Berlin and other important cities. He is said to have more important contacts than any other newsman in European countries.

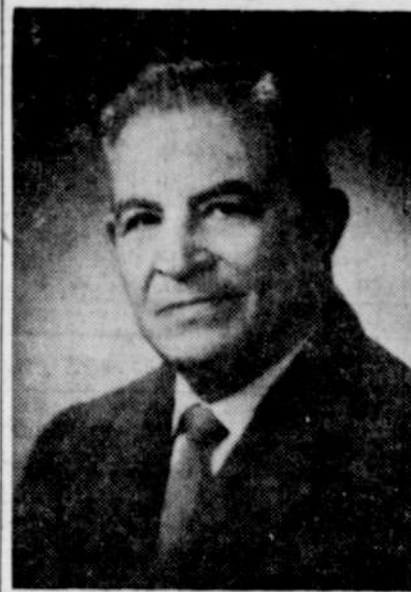

Mr. Udlinek was born March 25, 1917, in Wallace, S.D., and attended schools there. On Nov. 17, 1937, he was united in marriage to Velma Shortreed in Nampa. The couple resided in Buhl before moving 23 years ago to Homedale where they had since farmed.

In addition to Mrs. Udlinek, survivors include a son, Dennis, at home; a daughter, Mrs. Jolene Wells of Oakland, Calif.; his mother, Mrs. Matilda Udlinek of Homedale; six brothers, Vincent of Notus, William of Leigh, Neb., Richard of Nyssa, Allen of Pasco, Wash., Robert and Leo, both of San Leandro, Calif., and one granddaughter.

of water pipeline and 1000 miles of main roads and a tie-in with 55 recreational developments.

The cost is estimated at \$16.5 million, spread over a seven-year period, with \$1 million to be spent the first year, \$1.5 million the second, \$2 million the third and \$3 million each of the next four years.

Water Conservation Methods

With storage of irrigation water becoming lower each of the past few years, users have become alert to the need of conserving it in all ways possible. State and county agents are working diligently on educating users on the various ways of doing this. (The ditch project set up at the experiment station April 5 is covered in a separate story in the Journal.)

Agricultural specialists have determined largely for each crop the amount of water necessary to keep it growing, how wet to keep it, when to irrigate and how best it should be applied.

'Physicals' for Crop Health

"Physicals" for farms come in the form of soil tests and are now considered as important to them as for military inductees or life insurance applicants.

These determine the type of soil, what essential minerals are lacking and the amount needed to bring the land to maximum production of various crops. It takes the guesswork out of the type of fertilizer to use and the amount necessary.

Curiously enough, these tests have indicated in many cases that farmers were using more lime or fertilizer than needed.

Other Crop Helps Named

Among other aids offered the farmer today are methods for effective weed control, proper drainage, seed testing and marketing advice.

Malheur county is predominantly agricultural; the farmer is king, and being so recognized, has technical help available for almost any problem that arises.
