Mrs. Ward was born April 5, 1867, in Noble, Ill., a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Neathery. She came with her parents in 1885 to Malheur county. The family owned and operated the second hotel in Ontario.

She was united in marriage Sept. 9, 1891, to John A. Ward in Caldwell, Idaho, and they soon began farming in the Owyhee community. Shortly after her marriage, her parents also moved to a farm near Nyssa.

Five children were born to the Ward couple, four of whom still reside in the Nyssa community. They are Audrey, Frank, Earl and Mrs. Cecil Coleman. Mrs. Ward now has 16 grandchildren and 28 great-grandchildren living.

Mr. Ward, a lifetime stockman and farmer, succumbed Oct. 12, 1945. A son, Albert, was killed in 1920 while riding for horses in the hills.

At the age of 95, Mrs. Ward is apparently in good health. She is unable to walk, due to a leg amputation at the age of 79, but sits in her chair a part of every day. She enjoys visitors and her daughter states that her ability to remember is much better than that of other family members.
