

City Librarian Reviews Latest Books Added to Shelves at Local Library

According to City Librarian Joy Bell, a number of new volumes have recently been added to the shelves of Nyssa library and are now available to patrons. They include:

ADULT BOOKS:

"Land of Plenty" by Wheeler McMillen. In this lively book, the former editor of the Farm Journal traces the magnificent story of American agriculture, from its colorful beginnings to its important role in our present-day lives. He describes the many methods of farming and the vast assortment of crops which help make the United States such a well-fed country.

"Training You to Train Your Dog" by Blanche Saunders. Anyone who has ever owned a dog, or expects to own one, can profit by Blanche Saunders' totally new approach to the subject of training dogs in obedience. The whole idea behind the book is summed up in the title. It is the owner who needs training.

"Adventures in the Arctic" by Peter Freuchen. In these fascinating pages, Peter Freuchen tells of his battles against snow and ice, bears, wolves, walrus and narwhal in a land where he faced death many times. He tells of his explorations across the uncharted Arctic wilderness, stories of incredible hardship, hunger and danger.

"The Edge of Sadness" by Edwin O'Connor. This is the story of a middle-aged priest and the several worlds in which he finds himself—the exuberant, turbulent, bubbling Irish-American world in which he was born and raised and the far different, somber, silent, shabby world to which through various circumstances his life has taken him.

"North from Thursday" by Jon Cleary. In his latest novel, and his finest to date, our author takes us north from Thursday Island to New Guinea—to its outer regions where even today the natives

practice head-hunting and cannibalism. Read this suspenseful story about the lives of a few people living and working in the isolated territory.

"Cripple Mah and the New Order" by C. Y. Lee. The author has written a tender story and, at the same time, a bitter satire on Chinese communism in this story of love and struggle.

"The Judas Tree" by A. J. Cronin. Rich, charming and accomplished, David Moray is a man especially attractive to women. From the depths of poverty he has risen to dazzling financial success and at a comparatively young age retired to Switzerland to enjoy its rewards. Detached from the dangers and anxieties of the world in the luxury of his beautiful estate, he is prepared to exist in perfect happiness.
