Government Session In Idaho Capital City

Five Nyssa Hi-Y and Tri-Hi-Y members joined 200 students from 50 schools in Idaho to attend the Youth and Government conference held in Boise. The two-day conference, April 6-7, was held in the chambers of the Idaho state capitol building.

The delegation from Nyssa included Gilbert Lopez, senator; Pat Wright, representative; Mary Kay Olsen, senate messenger; Karen Saito, reporter; Chuck Obenchain, observer and secretary to the Health and Safety committee. The group was accompanied by Douglas Wilkerson, adviser.

In the opening session of the mock legislature, Gov. Robert E. Smylie of Idaho welcomed the youth elected to serve at the conference. Youth Governor Charles Hays of Pierce, Idaho, also addressed the delegates.

Of the 50 bills submitted to the legislature only seven were passed in both the House and Senate. Of these only five were signed by the youth governor.

The Nyssa group's House bill number nine pertained to standardization of sanitary conditions in farm labor camps. The bill was passed by a vote of seven to two in the Health and Safety committee. Due to the lack of time, the measure was unable to enter either the House or the Senate.

The 26th annual two-day session was sponsored by the YMCA.

"Russia and the West Under Lenin and Stalin" by George F. Kennan. A former ambassador to the Soviet Union reviews Soviet-Western relations, tracing growth of misunderstanding and hostility since 1918.

"Conquest Without War," compiled and edited by N. H. Mager. A clearly organized analysis of Soviet intentions and techniques as revealed by Khrushchev's own words, supplemented by commentaries from Soviet and Western authorities and by relevant facts and figures.

"How to Survive the H-Bomb—and Why" by Pat Frank. The author gives an informed view of what to expect in the event of nuclear war and suggests serious thought and planning for anyone who would like to be among the survivors.

"Before I Sleep" by James Monahan. The last days of Dr. Tom Dooley.

"Slums and Suburbs" by James B. Conant. A commentary on schools in metropolitan areas. Selected as one of the outstanding books of 1961.

"The Creation of the Universe" by George Gamow. Revised to include developments of the last 10 years in the argument between the expanding universe and the steady state theories and also new ideas on the origin of chemical elements.

"Orion Book of the Sky" by Jean-Claude Pecker. A very readable survey of man's beliefs and scientific investigation of the sky since ancient times, ending with comments on practical astronomy and astrophysics.

"Parents and Religion" by J. Gordon Chamberlin. Here for concerned readers of all denominations is a thoughtful examination of current aims, concepts and practices in Christian education.

"Fate Is the Hunter" by Ernest K. Gann. A true account of the author's start as an airlines pilot and the dangerous missions he flew for the Air Transport Command in World War II.

"The Aces" by Frederick Oughton. An account of the leading fighter pilots of World War I.

"But Not in Shame" by John Toland. A dramatic account that covers the period from the day

"Seven Plays" by Bertolt Brecht. A substantial selection of the author's plays which have in recent years triumphed on the stages of Western Europe.

"Barry Goldwater: Freedom Is His Flight Plan" by Stephen Shadegg. A profile of the senator, who is a favorite standard-bearer of the conservatives along with his speeches and statements, by a long-time friend.

"Daily Life in Carthage" by Gilbert Charles-Picard. A vivid panorama of people and their pursuits, a thoroughly researched account of Carthage's triumphs and failures from the years of her settlement to her death agony six centuries later.

"The Happy Critic" by Mark Van Doren. A collection of essays. "A Majority of Scoundrels" by Don Berry. The period in which the Rocky Mountain Fur company flourished, 1822-1834, coincided with the peak years of the American fur trade. Told largely in terms of the trappers, traders and politicians of the time, this account of the company describes the various expeditions, the yearly rendezvous, Indian troubles, the competition with Hudson Bay and, later, American Fur, and the collapse of the company.

"Using Wayside Plants" by Nelson Coon. How to identify and use wild plants of roadside and woodland for food, medicine and nature craft.

"McCall's 1001 Questions on Sewing Answered by Meg Carter." Wardrobe planning, pattern selection, general work procedures and finishing touches are among the questions discussed in this book.

Nyssa Bank Deposits Show Increase; Loans Down From Year Ago

Nyssa branch of First National Bank of Oregon reported first quarter deposits of \$5,432,840 and loans outstanding of \$3,945,401, according to Branch Manager Leonard Hewett.

Comparable totals for the local branch a year ago were \$4,820,837 in deposits and \$4,127,904 in loans.

Statewide, record highs for springtime deposits and loans were posted by First National of Oregon, according to Ralph J. Foss, president.

Deposits of \$893,760,887 were reported compared with \$866,423,020 in April a year ago. Loans outstanding in the 88-office banking organization totaled \$502,072,518, for a gain of \$18,959,569 over the April 1961 figure.

Pull-Tab Tins and Boilable Packages Forecast for Easier Food Preparation

With about \$18 billion being spent annually for packaging materials, what is in the future for American housewives who have long complained about the box of soap or cereal which is tough to open or the bag which doesn't "tear here for easy opening?"

Tin cans with a pull-tab opening which removes the lid, lighter weight glass bottles and more packaging in single and double servings are some of the conveniences in store for future consumers, according to R. Bruce Holmgren, editor of Package Engineering, Chicago.

His forecasts were made at a packaging short course at Oregon State university.

A boilable bag containing a complete dinner, which is packaged in a polyethylene pouch and cooked in the bag by the housewife without the bother of cooking dishes, is available now in limited quantities in certain areas in the county.

New Bottles Developed

Glass companies have developed glass containers which are lighter in weight but as strong as heavier-weight glass. This new glass is used primarily for non-returnable bottles.

Consumers are going to see crackers in a single-wrap carton where foil is laminated to a firm cardboard for maximum moisture-proofing. Cellophane and polyethylene are also used as liners in single-wrap cartons to keep moisture out.

Oil will be put into paperboard cartons with foil laminated to the paperboard, instead of the traditional can or bottle.

More Large Packages Predicted

More family-size packages of consumer goods are going to be on the market. Some frozen vegetables are now packaged in the two-pound bags and consumers are going to find more of this type of packaging.

More and more plastics will be used. Detergents appeared in plastic a few years ago and now consumers are finding liquid bleaches in plastic. Other liquids are going to be put in plastics and eventually more liquids will be put in pressure cans such as those used now for whipped cream.

Patriot's Day Bell Ringing to Denote Unity of Americans

"Bells Across the Nation" will ring out a message of American unity and love of liberty on Patriots' day, next Thursday, April 19.

At 10 a.m. PST (9 o'clock in Nyssa) bells, chimes and carillons should ring out for a four-minute period and the flag be displayed, according to announcement made by Oregon State department of the American Legion.

"Bells Across the Nation" is not a new call to arms but rather a voluntary demonstration that America is armed—armed in unity, spirit and in deep moral conviction. It will serve to signal leaders of Godless Communism that Americans do appreciate and will maintain their cherished freedoms.

Foamed polystyrene is being used instead of excelsior or newsprint for cushioning materials. The foamed, slightly flexible plastic, for example, can be molded to fit exactly over a piece of photographic equipment for shipping. The consumer opening the package simply removes the piece of plastic without any mess.

New Packaging in Drugs Field

More products in the drug and pharmaceutical field are being put into new types of packaging such as roll-on deodorants, medication for burns in a pressure can and toothpaste in a pressure can.

The manufacturing industry is constantly looking for packaging processes and materials which are more economical and convenient, it was noted.

The packaging short course was offered by the OSU department of food science and technology as a service to food processing industries of the Pacific Northwest.
