7:30 p.m.—Way of the Cross.

Holy Saturday: 7:30 p.m.—Easter vigil includes blessing of the new fire and Easter candle, baptismal service with scripture reading, chanted litany of the saints, blessing of baptismal water, renewal of promises made at baptism and eucharistic service.

Easter Sunday: Nyssa—Masses at 8 and 11 a.m. Adrian—Mass at 9:30 a.m.

Confessions: Before and after Holy week services.

Holy Saturday—4 to 6 p.m. and after the Easter vigil mass.

He was born July 19, 1898, in West Jordan, Utah, a son of William W. and Margaret Eliza Bateman Irving. He was united in marriage to Ruth Brown on Jan. 2, 1926, in Ogden, Utah. The rites were later solemnized in the LDS temple at Logan, Utah.

The Irving couple began farming in 1926 near Woods Cross, Utah, moving to a farm near Nyssa in 1943. Mrs. Irving succumbed in July 1956 and one child died in infancy.

Survivors include one son, Eldred W. Irving, Jr., of Dos Palos, Calif.; two daughters, Mrs. Janet Lahte of Portland and Mrs. Deane Martinez of San Diego, Calif. Also surviving are three sisters, Mrs. Margaret McQuarrie of Salt Lake City, Mrs. Roena Turner of Los Angeles, Calif., and Mrs. Muriel Laurence of Los Angeles; and six grandchildren.

Interment was made in Nyssa cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper Funeral home. Pallbearers were William Wahlert, E. E. Bush, Parley Feik, Waynard Talbot, Edward Larsson and Max Moore.

World-famed accordionist Arnie Hartman will conduct a one-night, all-church sacred concert Tuesday evening, April 24, at 8 p.m. in the Nyssa Church of the Nazarene, according to Omar Barnhouse, host pastor.

Having appeared in many of the leading entertainment centers of various nations before countless thousands of people, while engaged in secular music work, Hartman was recognized by Musicians' magazine as "the world's foremost accordionist." His versatility and adeptness to the accordion have placed him with leading musicians of contemporary times.

Since Hartman's conversion to Christianity, his musical productions have been channeled along Christian service lines and his appearance here is in conjunction with a current tour of western states. Featured on the accordion in his concerts of this type are some of the great hymns of all times, along with some of the more contemporary gospel music, marches, anthems and a few novelty numbers to delight the younger members of his audience.

The concert will be for the entire area and is open for everyone to attend regardless of religious affiliation, the Rev. Barnhouse emphasized. There will be no admission charge but a freewill offering will be taken.

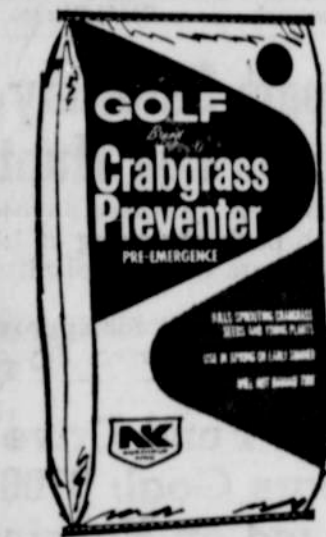

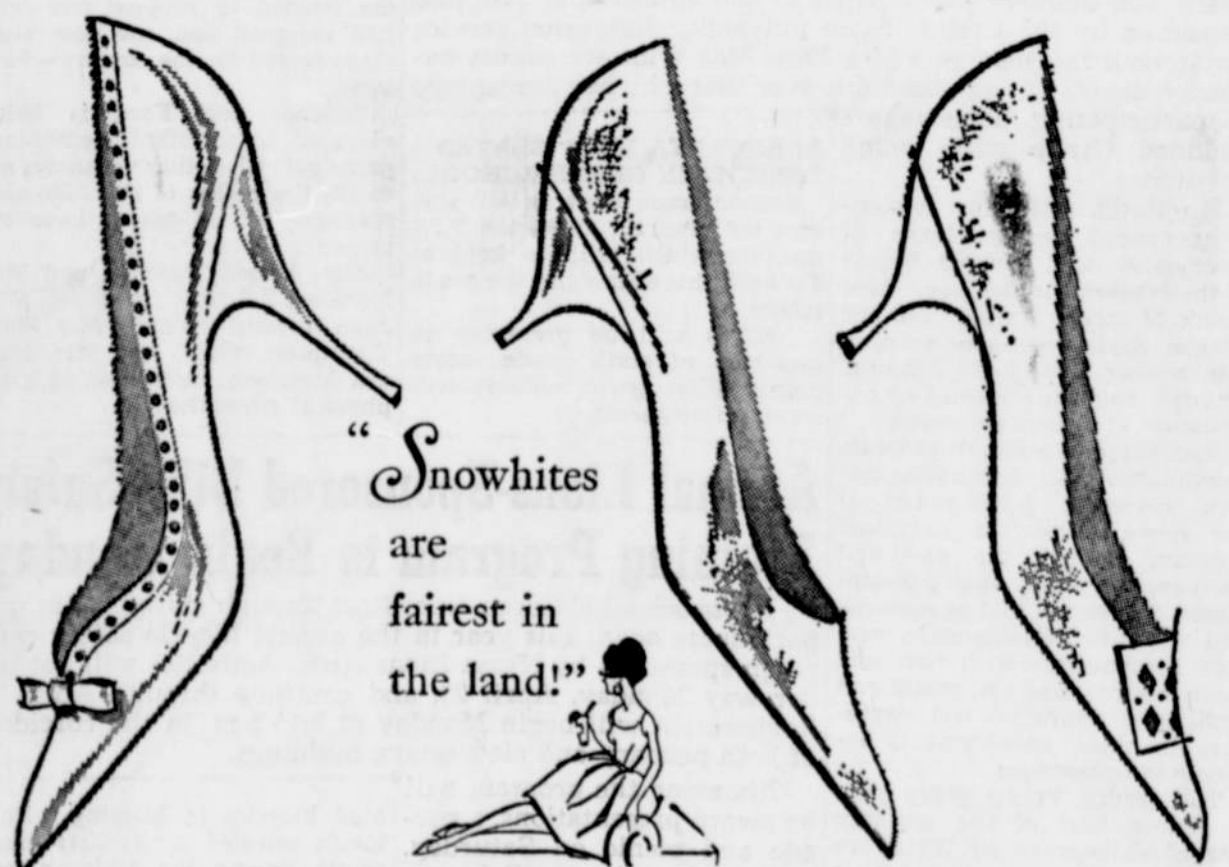
