

County Potato Growers and Handlers Select Members of Control Committee

Potato growers and handlers of Malheur county and southwestern Idaho selected representatives last week to serve on the control committee for the local potato marketing agreement, according to Turner Bond, county extension agent.

In separate meetings held April 13, growers selected William B. Russell of Nyssa as their committeeman, with Joe Saito, Ontario, alternate member. The handlers group re-named J. Williams, Caldwell, as their committeeman, with George Sugai of Payette as alternate member. The growers group met in Nyssa Friday evening, following the meeting of handlers in Ontario at noon.

The two committeemen from this area will become part of an eight-member control committee to set shipping regulations on potatoes marketed from Idaho and Malheur county, Bond said. The remaining five committee members consist of two growers and one handler from eastern Idaho and two growers and one handler from central Idaho.

Committee to Set Regulations

The full committee will meet prior to the start of potato shipping to establish regulations that may include minimum sizes and grades of potatoes that may be shipped from the area. Other factors the committee may regulate if members see fit include the maturity of potatoes shipped and type of containers used.

The marketing agreement on potatoes under which this committee functions covers only the area of Idaho and Malheur county, Bond says, and is the same agreement that has been in effect since 1949. Recent proposals for a marketing order of national scope are still in the discussion stage and have had no effect on existing marketing agreements or orders.

Miller Henderlinder Rites Held Monday; Interment at Melba

Funeral rites for Miller Henderlinder of Melba were conducted Monday afternoon, April 16, 1962, at Alsip Funeral chapel in Nampa with the Rev. W. B. Hiller of Southside Methodist church officiating. Mr. Henderlinder succumbed last Thursday morning in a Nampa hospital.

He was born Oct. 26, 1887, in Boise, a son of John and Margaret Henderlinder, early Idaho pioneers. He was united in marriage Feb. 10, 1913, to Florence Wolfe.

The Henderlinder couple farmed in the Five Mile community near Boise until 1926 at which time they moved to the Deer Flat area where they continued farming until 1940. They then operated the Lake Shore service until in the fall of 1960. Upon retirement they moved to Melba.

The deceased was a member of Owyhee Gem and Mineral society, Owyhee County Historical society, Southside Grange No. 99 and Sons and Daughters of Idaho Pioneers.

In addition to his widow of the home, he is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Eleanor Roberts of route 3, Parma, Mrs. Marie Douglas and Mrs. Lucille Blades of Nampa; five grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Interment was made in the Melba cemetery.
