Hearing Scheduled On Scales and Meters License Reductions

At a public hearing in Salem on May 11, the state department of agriculture will propose a reduction in four of the 10 types of licenses issued on weighing and measuring devices in commercial use in Oregon. The hearing will convene in the department's conference room in the capital city.

O. K. Beals, assistant director, says the department will propose these reductions: from \$3 to \$2.50 on scales with a 400 to 1160-pound capacity, from \$8 to \$7 on 1161-7500-pound capacity scales, from \$2.50 to \$2 on service station gas pumps and from \$7.50 to \$6 on fuel oil meters two inches and under.

The department proposals stem from a 1961 law which requires the readjustment of fees downward, after public hearings, in a range that permits a maximum \$30,000 cushion for emergencies.

"Unless reduced as the department proposes, the estimated balance would reach \$39,000 by July 1, 1963," Beals says.
