Homemaking Writer Reveals Pointers In Barbecuing; Lists Favorite Recipes

With the aroma of barbecued meat in the air and the man of the house decked in chef's cap and apron, spring has finally fully sprung.

If you don't enjoy the savory flavor of barbecued meat because you can't afford a grill, here is a tip for you. Put sand in the bottom of an old sink or for a portable grill use an old discarded toy wagon or wheelbarrow.

You only need a few briquets or pieces of charcoal, don't cover the entire grill. Remember foods cook much better in coals than in the flames. For low heat place the coals far apart; for high heat put them closer together.

Squirting the coals with a water gun or covering them with a lettuce leaf are unique but very effective ways to douse the fire.

Now you are set to begin cooking. Here are a few ideas to make barbecuing more interesting:

Corn Cooked in Foil

Husk and remove silk from ears of corn. Lay each ear in a piece of aluminum foil and spread with soft butter. Sprinkle with salt, add one teaspoon of water and wrap in drug store fold. Place on hot coals or grill for about 10 minutes. Turn several times. For extra zest sprinkle with fruit barbecue sauce before cooking. Potatoes and other vegetables may be cooked the same way.

Fruit Barbecue Sauce

1 (6 oz.) can of frozen pineapple-grapefruit juice concentrate.
1 teaspoon of salt.
1/4 teaspoon ginger.
3 tablespoons lemon juice.
6 tablespoons butter or margarine.
Thaw juice concentrate and combine with salt, ginger and lemon juice. Heat to boiling. Before using fruit barbecue sauce for basting, reheat and glaze with butter. Makes 1 1/2 cups.

Beefburgers

1 pound of ground beef.
1 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon pepper.
1 tablespoon grated onion or dehydrated onion soup.
1 tablespoon herbs.
2 tablespoons water, broth or milk.

Barbecue sauce to taste.
Mix ingredients gently. Form into six patties and grill.

Springtime Salad

1 package lime flavored gelatin.
1 package lemon gelatin.
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard.
1/4 teaspoon salt.
1/4 cup finely diced onion.
1/4 cup thinly sliced radishes.
2 ripe bananas.

Combine gelatins and dissolve according to directions. Pour enough gelatin to make a thin layer in a ring mold; put in refrigerator and let set. Let rest of jello slightly thicken and fold in the rest of the ingredients except one banana. Peel and arrange the second banana on top of the firm jello. Pour vegetable-gelatin mixture over banana layer making sure all ingredients are well covered with gelatin. Chill until firm (3 to 4 hours). Unmold and serve with tangy dressing. Makes six to eight servings.

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
