Emmett slipped by Nyssa 13-8 to give the Bulldogs a 1-4 mark in SRV-A league action. Jim Roberts blasted two homers to lead the Huskies at the plate. The contest was in Nyssa April 24.

The Huskies opened with five runs in the first inning. The host squad tallied one in the second when Dub Jones walked and Terry Thompson pounded a long double to left field.

Emmett pushed across a pair of markers in the third and again in the fourth. Singles by John Beck, Terry Thompson and Jim Kodama and a double by Jones accounted for three Bulldog runs in the third. Kodama tripled in the fifth to drive in two runs, making the score 9-6 in Emmett's favor.

Scoring three in the sixth and one in the seventh, the Huskies put the game on ice. Nyssa chased in two runs in the sixth but couldn't catch the Huskies.

Jones was the losing hurler. He and reliever Jim Kodama scattered eight hits. Johnson collected the win. Giving up seven hits, Johnson needed help from John Foruria in the sixth.

Most outstanding effort of the day was the toss of 168 feet, 2 inches recorded in the discus by Terry Baker of Ontario. The flip was 2 feet, 8 inches better than the current Oregon state record.

Bulldogs Paige Zobell and Mike Savage kept their unblemished records in their specialties. Zobell won the pole vault with an 11-foot, 10-inch climb, and Savage edged Emmett's Steve Hoff in the 440-yard dash. Savage was timed at 53.3 seconds.

A Community Project

County Judge Ellis White and Commissioners Jake Fischer and Earl Flock got busy and secured outside help to finance the county's part of the cost. The county was supervising agency on the construction.

Paul House, manager of North Board of Control, was "drafted" as engineer and with his agency furnishing labor and machinery, together with Malheur county road district No. 2 donating the same, work was started on the roadbed. The county also furnished labor and what machinery it had available.

The road was widened and covered with six inches of base rock preparatory to oiling.

Contract was let to Leseberg for \$78,445 to complete the project, with a completion date of Sept. 1, 1962.

Some time later the state proposed to add another \$10,000 and furnish guard rails, provided the county could work out contract with Leseberg to complete the road on to Cherry Creek resort. Under the agreement the county would erect the guard rails. This was done by the county and the road extended.

Old Railroad Bed Used

The original road was the old railroad bed abandoned in 1935 after completion of the Owyhee dam in 1933. After the old ties had been removed Nyssa Boat club members promoted grading the former roadbed, using the old railroad bridges across the streams, to have a rough road to the lake.

Then about 1958 through the combined efforts of the same agencies that recently worked on the new road and with \$3000 donated by Izaak Walton league of Malheur county, one span of the steel bridge from Snake river at Nyssa was moved to the Owyhee river crossing and put in place.

The road around the lake above the dam was started by Cherry Creek Resort corporation about 1954 and with cash donated by local sportsmen for fuel and an operator of a Caterpillar. It was finished about 1955. About 1958 the state highway department spent a considerable amount to improve this section and put in a state park along the lakefront.

So, all the way from a rough beginning to the finished product, the road has been a community project and shows what can be done with united efforts. All who have had any part in this are due the thanks of all the others who will have the pleasure of a decent road for years to come.
