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#### Exercise Your Voting Privilege

We Americans are garrulous people about equality for all races, color and creeds. We pride ourselves as being liberal. Volumes have been written in recent years. especially in the halls of congress, on civil rights and granting voting privileges to the underprivileged colored people of the southern states.

A bill is now under consideration, supported by at least one of our Oregon senators, to tell the states what limitations they may use in establishing voting rights.

Yet, we here in Oregon, who merely have to register our party affiliation by a certain date, turn out a minority to vote in all elections. As a result we are ruled by a minority, not by a majority. This applies on the national, state and local level.

One of our reader's Letter to the Editor this week calls attention to the coming primary May 18, exhorting all to vote then. But we have a school election this Monday and all eligible should take time to vote. The hours are from 2 to 8 p.m.—the place at Adrian is the grade school building and in Nyssa at the junior high building.

Two directors are to be elected in each of the districts. Adrian district voters will pass judgment on a budget with \$154,616 outside the 6 percent limitation and Nyssa

These are your schools, you pay the taxes, you elected the directors and now they need to know if you approve their judgment in figuring the costs of operation for the coming year.
