Professor at BYU Slated to Address Area LDS Seniors

Ivan J. Barrett, member of the Brigham Young university faculty, will address LDS early morning seminary graduates of Nyssa and Weiser stakes in two separate appearances this weekend.

J. Blaine Holladay, area seminary coordinator, announced that dates for the two graduations have been set at 8 p.m. Friday, May 11, in Nyssa and Saturday, May 12, at Weiser. Both events are scheduled to be held in the stake meeting houses. The public is invited to attend.

Professor Barrett is an outstanding youth speaker. He has his degree in speech arts and religious education, and teaches church history and doctrine at BYU. He has served in official capacities in both ward and stake of the church and has traveled extensively in fulfilling various speaking engagements.

The early morning seminaries are part of the general department of education of the church, which directs the eight-year religious program for all high school and college students. Over 1500 high school students have been enrolled in 65 classes throughout this area during the year, according to Holladay.
