It will be republished on May 17 and 24.

Hearing will be held June 1 and notice of election published June 7 and 14. Election is slated for Tuesday, June 26, from 2 to 8 p.m. in the little theater.

All interested parties are again asked to attend the public hearing Monday night, May 14.

County School Superintendent Emery Skinner announced Wednesday that all other county school budgets were approved and the junior college proposal passed by 1441 to 647 with all districts approving except Annex. It failed there by a 16 to 15 vote.

Exterior of the building will be of pre-fab metal and concrete block. Parking space will be ample for 150 cars.

The incorporators will be the builders with Robert Heldt of Nyssa in charge, under supervision of Architect Harold Shaw of Caldwell. Completion is expected to be approximately Aug. 25, in time for bowling season this fall.

New books going into circulation Saturday, May 12, at Malheur county library include the following:

"In the Clearing" by Robert Frost. Forty poems, his first collection of new ones since 1947.

"Thou Shalt Not Fear" by Bud Collyer. Inspirational readings that present observations of essential Christian truths.

"The Coming Fury" by Bruce Catton. The first volume of a centennial history of the Civil war that opens with the Democratic convention of 1860 and closes with the first Battle of Bull Run in July 1861.

"A Time to Stand" by Walter Lord. Reconstructs the defeat of the Texans by the Mexicans at the Alamo in realistic terms rather than legendary concepts of the event, showing the besieged in their moments of folly as well as of heroism.

"From the Shadow of the Mountain" by Van Wyck Brooks. The final volume of the author's autobiographical writings concerned primarily with his many literary friends.

"Tested Ways to Help Your Child Learn" by Virginia Burgess Warren. Most of the nearly 800 suggestions for parents to prepare for and accelerate the learning process are designed for use with the pre-school child and the child in the lower grades.

"Hidden Channels of the Mind" by Louisa E. Rhine. The author presents and classifies the types and forms of extrasensory perception and uses as examples innumerable case histories of personal experiences reported to the laboratory.

"The Writer's Handbook" edited by A. S. Burack. What to write, how to write it and where to sell what is written.

"Living Like Indians" by Allan A. Macfarlan. Ideas and projects from authentic American Indian lore including campcraft, nature study, games and wilderness living.

"500 Miles to Go" by Al Bloemker. The story of the Indianapolis Speedway.
