

Instructor Gives Resume of Talks By Directors of Special Education

In last week's issue of the Journal a report was given of a two-day special education meeting held May 4-5 in Eugene.

Special education teachers from Nyssa were among those who attended the annual session. They feel that talks given by featured speakers will be of interest to parents as well as other Journal readers.

Following are brief reviews of two talks presented by directors of special education from Chicago and Detroit. Resumes of two additional topics will appear in next week's issue of the Journal.

Dr. Frances Mullen, director of special education, Chicago Public Schools, talked on "Agency-School Cooperation in a Program for Emotionally Disturbed Children."

This speaker said that the 20th century is seeing a definite increase in the number of children

who are socially maladjusted because of emotional disturbances. "Diagnosis and therapy for these children are the responsibility of the medical profession. The school must start with the behavioral symptoms and many of these can be recognized as early as kindergarten age."

Dr. Mullen went on to say that first grade children who are extremely aggressive, who seem unable to accept group play, who continue to play alone, who demand a great deal of special attention and who find it impossible to sit quietly for even small periods of time, are often flashing warning signals to teachers and parents that further consideration needs to be given.

Such children after proper diagnosis, might require more individual attention than can be given in a classroom of 25 or 30 children. This would mean extra teaching from specially trained teachers and a close, cooperative understanding between home and school.

Discusses New Issues

Dr. Paul Voelker, director of special education, Detroit, Mich., had the following things to say about "New Issues in Special Education:"

"It is important that special education services relate more closely to school guidance and counseling programs. There is a growing need for job surveys in local communities. Vocational rehabilitation needs to dovetail with information already on file in special education departments. There needs to be early recognition of children who show symptoms of delinquency."

Dr. Voelker said that many times the school provides the only possible therapeutic environment and he emphasized that the role of the school is:

1. To provide good diagnostic services (as early as grade 3).
2. To provide a better curriculum for pupils at all levels of ability.
3. To provide materials which are applicable to the varying abilities and skills.

He added that 50 percent of student failures are due to poor social adjustment and emotional instability and that a high percentage of these failures are to be found among students of exceptional intelligence.

Said Dr. Voelker: "Many areas are finding it profitable to hold extra classes for students of exceptional ability. These classes are held after school hours on a voluntary basis for talented students and the teachers are paid extra."

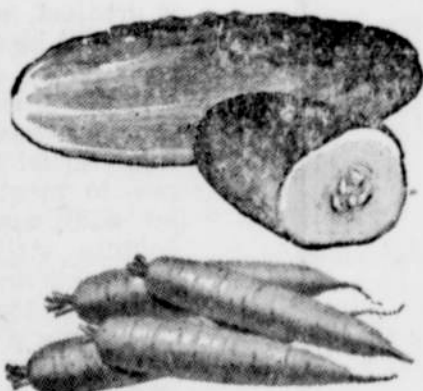
