HEALTH CARE FOR THE AGED

On May 20, 1962, a massive campaign will be launched to promote hospital and nursing home care for the aged, tied to the Social Security System.

The physicians of Payette and Malheur counties recognize that many financial problems exist in the care of many persons over 65, but believe this is a medical and social—not a political problem.

We object to the King-Anderson bill for the following reasons:

1. It is a **compulsory** program for which all Americans covered by Social Security must pay, regardless of whether they need or want the benefits provided.
2. It is **unfair**. 14,000,000 persons over age 65 who have not contributed one cent to this program would be supported by the nation's younger workers who would have to pay increasing Social Security taxes the rest of their working lives. Millionaires, those with independent means, those receiving pensions and retirement benefits would all be covered, while 2,500,000 Americans not covered by Social Security and where the need is greatest, would be ineligible.
3. It would be **expensive**. First year costs alone have been conservatively estimated at \$1.1 billion dollars and would soon soar far above this. Social Security taxes would rise to meet these costs, placing an additional burden on young couples striving to buy homes, farms, automobiles and machinery. It is estimated that the Social Security tax would equal or exceed the Income Tax for income of \$6,000 or less.
4. It is **unnecessary**. The financial status of those over 65 is steadily

improving. 49% of this group has some form of health insurance and by 1970, 90% can have it. 19,000,000 Americans are now covered by pensions.

5. It is not **free**! Basically it is a contract between the federal government and a hospital or nursing home. \$10.00 a day is deducted for the first nine days of hospitalization, with a minimum deduction of \$20.00. There is also a \$20.00 deductible tag on each complete diagnostic service. This means those receiving hospital care would pay the first \$90.00 of their hospital bill—if hospitalized for nine days—and the first \$20.00 of each complete diagnostic study.

6. It is **socialistic**. It would set up a vast government bureau to administer this plan with its own rules and decrees. Proponents admit this is just the foot in the door, and that eventually the coverage will be broadened to complete socialized medicine as in England, where one third of the doctors have left the country and are being replaced by immigrants from Pakistan and other foreign countries. Socialized medicine is but the opening wedge in socializing business, industry and agriculture.

You will be deluged with propaganda and misleading "facts" and statistics from those who would convert our country into a welfare state. Remember, what the federal government pays for it eventually controls.

Only you can stem the tide of socialism by installments. The most potent weapon you have is a letter to your Congressman. Once this program becomes law, it is gone beyond recall. For your sake, and your children's sake, write your Congressman and Senator today—THE HOUR IS LATE.

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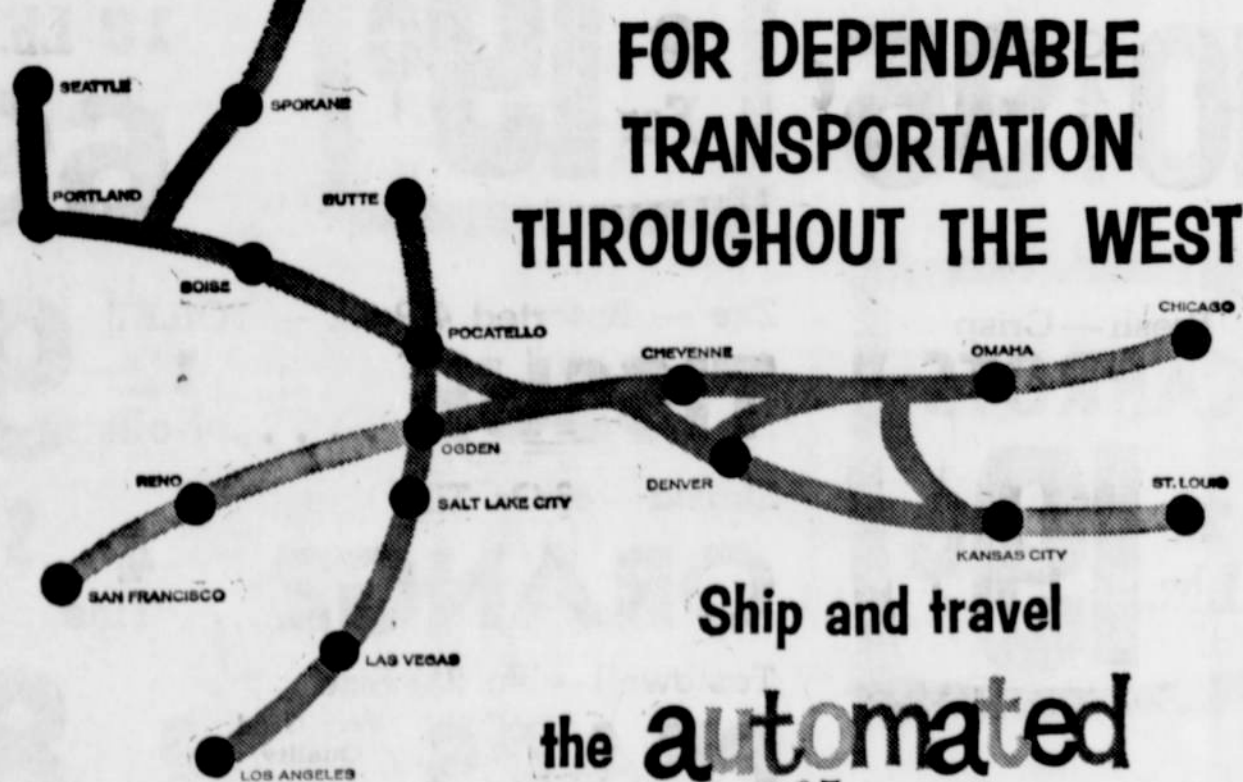
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
