General Improvement Seen in Pupils Taking Physical Therapy Treatments

During the past school year Malheur county has been especially fortunate to have the services of Marcelle Montgomery, physical therapist, who has made regular visits to this area. This program, a project of the Oregon Society for Crippled Children and Adults, is sponsored by the Easter Seal program and Emblem clubs of Oregon.

Although there is no prescribed fee, individuals may pay no more than \$3 per treatment. Miss Montgomery works in cooperation with local doctors and sees children only after receiving written prescriptions from them.

This program provides a badly needed service. At present 31 children in the Nyssa schools are under treatment. Six of these have crippling conditions caused by polio. Six more are receiving

help to develop neuro-muscular coordination and the rest are taking special exercises to correct defects in posture and gait.

It is impossible to fully estimate the value of such a program but the following generalities have been noted in regard to children who have been participating:

1. They are beginning to develop self-reliance and personal pride in achievement.
2. They are more able to meet the requirements of classroom routine.
3. They are beginning to have an idea of the values found in good systematic exercise.
