Mishap Claims Life Of Ernest D. Payne; Rites Held Tuesday

Funeral rites for Ernest D. Payne, 24, were conducted Tuesday afternoon, June 12, 1962, at the Nyssa LDS stake chapel with Bishop Frelle Blair officiating.

Mr. Payne of Myrtle Point, Ore., formerly of Nyssa, was killed early Saturday morning when his car slammed into a concrete divider post on Oregon highway 101 south of Coos Bay.

He was born Nov. 14, 1937, at Tremonton, Utah, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest C. Payne. The family moved to Nyssa when he was four years of age. He attended Nyssa schools and joined the Air Force, taking basic training at Parks Air Force base, Calif. His remaining four years in service were spent at Ajo, Ariz.

He was united in marriage to Elsie Arbogast on June 23, 1956, in Arizona. They made their home in that state for three years before returning to Nyssa in 1959. He was employed as a sheet metal worker at Eder Hardware company until 1961 when the family moved to Meridian. He worked for the Boise Home Trailer Building firm in the Idaho city for 11 months. At the time of his death he was employed by the Myrtle Point Lumber company.

Survivors include his widow; three sons, Ernest Milton, 5; Robert Jay, 3; Kenneth Allen, 2; his parents of Nyssa and grandmother, Mrs. Lucy Payne.

Also surviving are four brothers, Merlin J. of Nampa, Max D. and Larry C. of Kuna and Gary L. of Nyssa; two sisters, Mrs. Loretta Ellison of Myrtle Point and Anita Payne of Nyssa.

Concluding services were held at Nyssa cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home.

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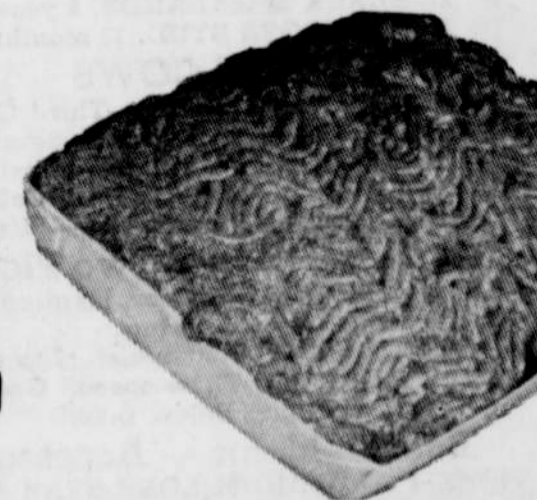
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
