Lunch and dinner will be provided each day for the visiting teachers by local Woman's Society of Christian Service. They will be guests of local Methodist families during their stay in Nyssa.

This summer session consists of a variety of classes in agriculture and home economics, as well as discussion groups for older members. General assemblies, county meetings and supervised recreation fill each afternoon and some form of entertainment is provided for each evening.

As nearly 2,000 4-H members from all over the state are attending, the opportunity to get acquainted with 4-H'ers from other parts of the state is one of the highlights of the meeting, according to Hauser.

Accompanying the Malheur delegates are Mrs. Zeola Nielsen of Cairo and Mrs. Betty Jean Philp of Adrian, in addition to Jan Gumprecht and E. M. Hauser, county extension agents.

Budget Figure Rises Over Previous Year

(which has since been dismissed by the court).

Social security and SIAI fund was increased from \$3600 to \$4200 due to increase in rates and salary raises.

Dump and pound attendant costs decreased from \$2220 to \$1200. (Man is drawing social security and the \$1200 is the maximum he can earn.)

City spraying program is up to \$2000 from \$500 last year, as plans call for six applications where only three were used last year.

Water fund utilities increased from \$4000 to \$4800, sewer materials and supplies are down from \$2050 to \$1300 and street lighting is up to \$8400 from \$7500 due to plans for additional lights.

Within Six Percent Limitation

Of the \$406,546 budget it is anticipated that only \$71,504 will be from direct property taxes and will be within the 6 percent limitation. Other major sources are: (1) bonds, \$125,000; (2) service charges, \$62,000; (3) sewer fund, \$48,915; (4) estimated cash balance, \$20,606; (5) gas tax apportionment, \$18,702; (6) licenses and permits, \$9000; (7) fines and penalties, \$8000; (8) liquor apportionment, \$7310.

City Manager Colby says he will be glad to go over any items not understood by Nyssa citizens.

Public hearing is set for 8 p.m. Thursday, June 28, at city hall.

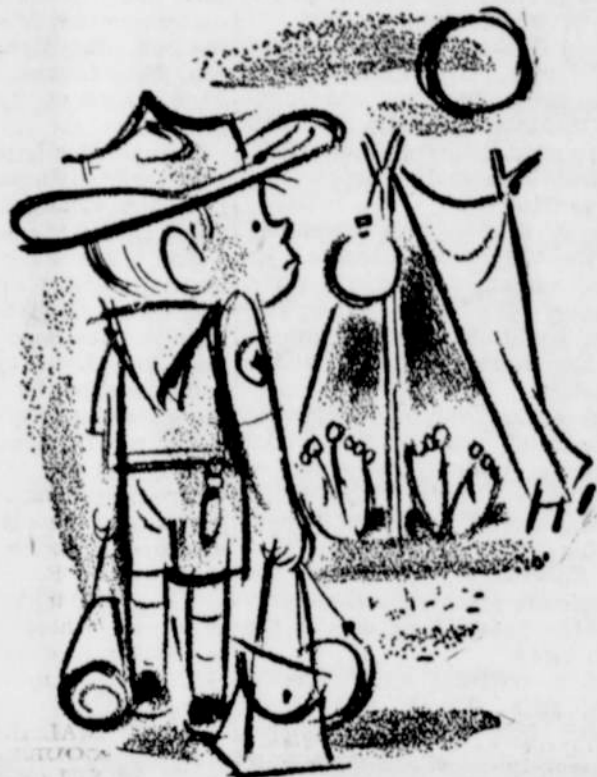

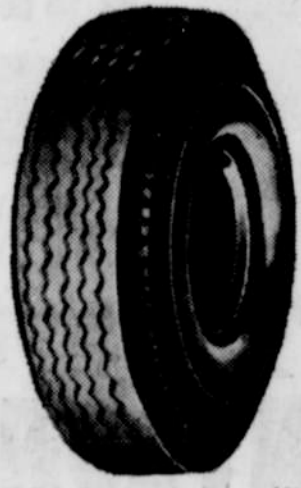
