pinch" and must seek new sources of revenue.

Recourse If Rejected Again  
If the present budget should fail to pass, the board can continue submitting them until voters approve (with \$300 additional expense each time) or they can make up one within the 6 percent limitation and not have to secure voter approval.

The latter, as pointed out in an article by Board Member Gene Stunz in this issue of the Journal, would call for drastic cuts and eliminate many of the extra-curricular activities.

The board urges that all legal voters exercise their democratic rights and fulfill their civic duty by voting in Tuesday's election.

### Oregon Families Needed To Host Foreign Students

Wanted: Oregon families to share their homes for two to three weeks this summer with youths from South America, Scandinavia and Southern Europe.

Ruth Brasher, state 4-H agent at Oregon State university, says that two International Farm Youth Exchange (IFYE) delegates have already arrived and are living with host families. Six others will come later this summer.

The IFYE program is an exchange of youths from the U.S. and overseas countries, conducted by the Cooperative Extension service and the National 4-H club foundation and financed by non-government funds. Purpose of the exchange is to help youths learn about other people by allowing them to live with families and share in work, play and community activities. Families are asked to accept the visitors as members of the family and not as special guests.

Farm and city families with at least one child living at home are invited to apply as hosts, says Miss Brasher. As far as possible, wishes of the host families are met in scheduling of the exchanges and meeting family interests. Families in all parts of Oregon are invited to take part in the program so IFYE's may get well-rounded experiences.

Host family applications are available from county extension agents. Applications are sent to the state 4-H office at OSU where final selections are made.

Already in Oregon homes are Giovanni Bordinon, a 23-year-old Italian farmer, and Felipe Obuljen, 28, of Argentina. The former is staying with the E. H. Eymans of Canby and the hosts for Obuljen are the Ron Davis family of Olex and R. L. Johns of Halsey.

August IFYE arrivals will be Helen Haralambaki of Greece; Ellen Petersen, Germany; Kyosti Toivonen, Finland; Inga Britt Olofsson, Sweden; Jean Francois Xavier de Cabrol, France; and Daniel Rodriguez, Uruguay.

### Weiser's Annual Fiddlers' Contest Begins Tomorrow

The 10th annual Northwest Old-time Fiddlers Festival starts tomorrow in Weiser with a record number of contestants registered, according to Homer Emmons, chairman.

Playoffs and eliminations start at 1 p.m. at junior high school gym and the evening performance begins at 7:30 when the northwest senior (over 70), junior (under 18) and trick fiddling championship contests take place. Also on the program is the regional (15 counties in southwestern Idaho and eastern Oregon) championship finals.

Eliminations for the northwest open contest starts at 1 p.m. Saturday and the semi-finals and finals begin at 8 p.m.

The contests are being held this year in the Pioneer Centennial Outdoor auditorium in Memorial park with seating capacity in excess of 5000. The latest sound equipment has been installed. Although the stage is not fully completed due to difficulties and the stage roof is not in place, this will not impair the program.

Should storm threaten on either Friday or Saturday, the contests will be held in the Eastside gym as in past years.

More than \$1000 in cash prizes, trophies and certificates will be awarded champions and runners-up in the five contests which draw oldtime fiddlers from all parts of the northwest.
