### \$1 1/2 Million Paid County Residents Yearly From S.S.

Total Social Security benefits of \$1,475,532 are now being paid each year to residents of Malheur county, according to Vernon A. Welo, manager of the La Grande district.

This amount represents an increase of approximately 13 percent over the annual rate of one year ago in Malheur county.

"Reasons for the increase are many," Welo explained. "There are more aged people; benefits are now payable to men at age 62 as well as to women; and less social security credit is needed to be eligible for old-age benefits."

The \$1,475,532 being paid annually in Malheur county goes to 1980 beneficiaries. The payments include those for old-age, for survivors of deceased workers and for disabled insured workers, Welo said.

The average monthly payment to a retired worker in Malheur county is \$72.56. The average monthly payment to a disabled worker is \$84.32.

A breakdown of beneficiary group, number of recipients and annual payment of each major type being paid in Malheur county is as follows:

Retired workers, 1174, \$1,022,172; wives or husbands, 346, \$153,816; widows or widowers, 117, \$87,432; mothers and children, 269, \$151,236; disabled workers and dependents, 74, \$60,876.

### Malheur, Harney Ranchers to Attend Hearing at Burns on Natural Resources

Ranchers of Malheur and Harney counties who lease some 450,000 acres of state-owned lands will have a chance to tell state legislators what they think should be done with it at a public hearing of the Interim Committee on Natural Resources June 23 at Burns. Many have already indicated they will do so.

Scheduled to preside at the 3 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. (PST) sessions in the Harney county courthouse is Rep. Robert Smith (R-Burns), a member of the committee and its sub-committees on fish and game, power, water, forestry, minerals, gas and oil.

In answers to a questionnaire, most state land leaseholders indicated they would welcome the opportunity to buy land. Most indicated also that the returns to public funds from the lands could be increased through an active range management program including reseeding, brush control and blocking.

The interim committee is considering several alternatives for recommendation to the 1963 legislature for beginning a management program on the grazing lands. So far they have held hearings in Prineville and Canyon City to receive suggestions from ranchers and range experts in those areas. A third hearing is scheduled June 22 at Lakeview.

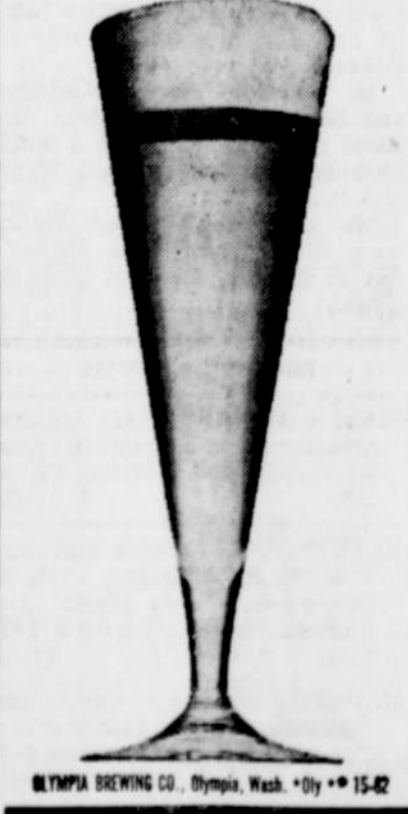
### AIRMAN VISITS PARENTS

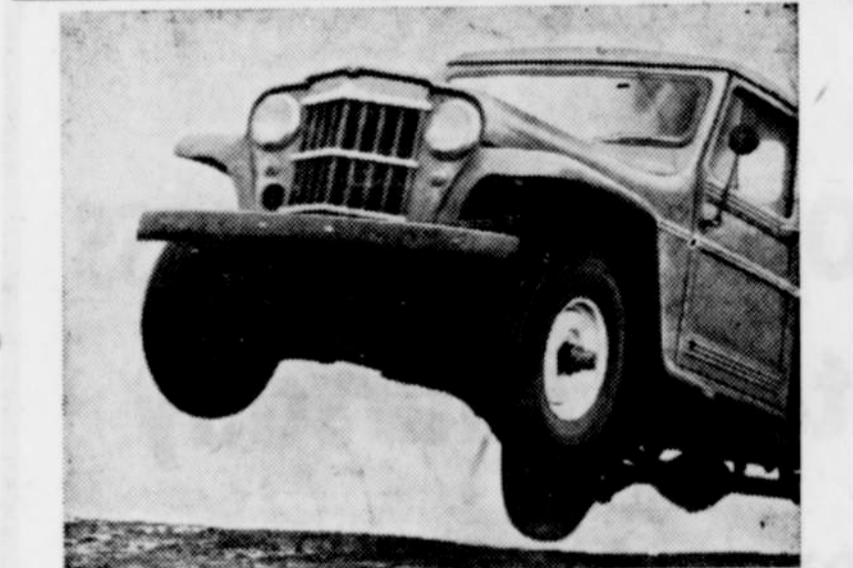
