Contractors Holcomb and Main have told the physicians that the new \$75,000 clinic structure should be completed and ready for occupancy at that time.

New Road District
Officers Selected;
Request Election

John Tucke, Willowcreek farmer and president of the county Farm Bureau, was named president of the newly formed county road district at a Vale meeting June 18.

Jack Dentel of Jordan Valley was elected secretary.

The district, known as Consolidated Road District No. 1, was formed by county court resolution in order to give the voters outside existing road districts and towns a chance to vote a tax levy for rural roads in their areas.

At the Vale meeting, following a question and answer session, the group voted to petition the court to hold an election and give the voters an opportunity to pass on a 10-mill tax levy for road construction and maintenance.

Voters living in the Annex, Brogan, Big Bend, Harper, Jordan Valley, Westfall, Vale and Willowcreek districts would be eligible to vote on the issue.

Court to Plan Study
For New County Jail

Malheur county court has taken steps to have an architect draw plans for a new county jail that could be built for near the \$125,000 that is available for that purpose.

The amount has been carried over as a part of the building fund and has not been used because previous construction bids for a new jail were from \$25,000 to \$75,000 above this figure. Previous courts felt the taxpayers would not support the additional cost.

The old jail has been considered inadequate, unsanitary and too unsound structurally for remodeling and repairing. A recent attack on the sheriff by an escaping prisoner focused the attention of the present court on the need for a new building.

New Medical Clinic to Open July 20



ABOVE PHOTO shows the new clinic building of Drs. K. E. Kerby (left) and K. A. Danford, which will be ready for occupancy soon. Directly behind the large windows is the reception room finished in birch paneling and blond brick. Behind the reception room is the receptionist's office, business office, employees' lounge and laboratory. Space is available for three physicians. Each doctor will have a consultation room and two examination rooms. Dentist's quarters are in the rear of the structure with space for two chairs. The building also houses rooms for minor surgery, examination, electrocardiograms, diathermy, drug storage and an x-ray department. The building is equipped with heat pump which heats in winter and cools in summer, all fluorescent lighting and light-colored floor tile. South rooms are finished in pale green with those on the north painted a light beige. There are three outdoor entrances. Under the structure is a full basement which at present will not be utilized. Behind the rock wall, which shows in the photo, is private and public parking space.—Staff Photos.

The 40- by 80-foot, one-story brick veneer building is designed for three physicians and a dentist, with all facilities on the ground floor and plenty of parking space.

In addition to the two local doctors, the building will house the dental office of Dr. J. R. Cundall who is presently in the basement of the clinic building housed by the two physicians.

Dr. Kerby Arrives in 1938

The present clinic building at 213 Main street was built by Dr. J. J. Sarazin in 1938. Dr. Kerby joined the staff in 1938, coming to Nyssa from Missouri where he took his internship. He left in 1941 for Army service and returned in 1945.

Dr. Lester Scott became affiliated with the clinic in 1947, leaving for the service in 1950. His office is now in Ontario.

Dr. Danford, a native of North Dakota, was a doctor in the Navy and came to Nyssa in 1952 from a practice in Mahanomen, Minn.

Dr. Sarazin retired from active practice approximately four years ago. His son, Dr. David W. Sarazin, whose present location is in Ray's Food Fair building at 2 North Main street, plans to move his office into the Sarazin clinic building soon to be vacated by Drs. Kerby, Danford and Cundall.

Oregon Requests
Lower Spud Rates
To Vie With Idaho

Paul T. Rowell, agricultural development chief for the Oregon Department of Agriculture, has asked railroads to give Malheur county potatoes adjustments in freight rates comparable to the reductions granted eastern Idaho potatoes.

In his request to the Transcontinental Fruit bureau at Chicago, Rowell points out that potato shipments to the U.S. central states are "very important items in the economy of Malheur county." To a lesser extent, potato shipments eastward involve the central Oregon production which would also be affected by the rate reduction, if granted.

Western Idaho shippers would also receive the adjustments sought for Oregon potato growers and shippers, especially those in Malheur county.

Rowell said the Oregon growers and shippers would be severely handicapped if they were not allowed a rate reduction comparable to that already granted eastern Idaho producers.

The state department of agriculture request to the railroads backs and supports a similar request made by the Oregon public utility commissioner.

Background Given

Roy was reared in Rooks county, Kan., graduated from Palco high school in 1927 and taught two years in a rural school there before moving with his parents to Nyssa in 1937. They opened their first O. K. Rubber Welders shop May 10, 1937, with one rubber welder and one tube repair spotter.

The first day their gross receipts were \$7.50, which Roy says, was a big day for them. It resulted from the sale of one 5.00 x 19 tire and repairing a few tubes.

Their gross the first year was \$1200. By 1951 they had increased that to \$24,000 and had erected the brick building at the present location of their shop and home.

In 1947 Roy purchased the business from his father and mother and has operated it ever since.

Overcomes Blind Handicap

There is nothing outstanding in the above success story except for the fact that Roy is totally blind. His blindness began in 1933 following a series of diseases. But that did not stop Roy. He learned to use his hands for all the operations necessary in the shop.

His sensitive fingers can tell him the condition of any tire, what it needs, if worth fixing, and what any repair job will cost. He is capable of operating any of the modern machinery he has

Third Budget Submitted for Nyssa
School District 26 Is Lower by \$1202
Than Approved Last Year by Voters

Eliminations and Reductions of Numerous Items Shrink Previous Budget by \$21,051

The board of directors and budget board of Nyssa School District No. 26 voted unanimously at a Wednesday afternoon meeting to cut \$21,051 off the original budget.

This third budget submitted to voters for operation of the 1962-63 school year will be \$1202 less than that approved last year. A sum of \$61,749 is outside the 6 percent limitation, and it is this figure that must be approved by the electors for this new budget to be approved.

The election date is set for Friday, July 13, with voting hours and place being the same as in the two previous elections—little theater, from 2 to 8 p.m.

Figure Cuts Listed

Items and costs eliminated from the last budget printed are:

School bus, \$6900; elementary assistant principal, \$5951; park (summer recreation), \$1100; typewriter and recording equipment, \$2000; improvement on elementary school grounds, \$3000; remodeling of elementary office, \$750; language laboratory, \$1000; adult education, \$500; bus drivers for field trips, \$150; and research on teaching machines, \$500.

Items reduced and amounts are: secretarial hire, \$1340; student body fund, \$500; furniture and equipment, \$1000; insulation, \$500; and moving retarded class from Arcadia school, \$1060.

Business Manager-Clerk Added

Items added were \$50 for election expense and \$6000 to hire a combination business manager and clerk of the board. This would free W. L. McPartland from these duties and permit full time supervisory activities.

These make the \$21,051 reduction from the last budget. Board members expressed themselves as making the cuts on items that would not interfere with basic educational needs of the students. They, together with members of the budget board, felt there were some items in the cut that would eventually have to be faced—especially those that pertained to the school physical plant.

Figures Misunderstood

Some board members said there was still confusion over the amount outside the 6 percent limitation. They asked that the Journal please stress that the \$61,749 outside the limitation, upon which the electors would vote, was not an increase from last year, but actually a reduction of \$20,696 from the \$82,445 approved by the voters.

Malheur Tax Rolls
Rise \$2½ Million
During Past Year

The assessed valuation of Malheur county has increased \$2,448,015 from last year, according to County Assessor John Koopman. This is an increase of approximately 7 percent.

The total for last year was \$36,832,620 and for this year, \$39,320,635. The assessed valuation is based on 25 percent of true cash value of the property.

Additions to the real estate assessment totals included changes made at the Amalgamated Sugar company plant and the Idaho Canning company factory, both of Nyssa, and the Terminal Ice plant in Ontario.

The class of 1913, Nyssa high school, held its second reunion Sunday with a picnic dinner held in the city park, starting at 12 noon. Some 50 people sat down to the "potluck" dinner with Mrs. Marion MacDonald Gribbon of Weiser, Idaho, as mistress of ceremonies.

The plan of holding a yearly get-together started last year, with Audrey Ward as organizer. The class of 1913 was used as a rallying point but the reunion has developed into a pioneer gathering of students and teachers associated with the Nyssa schools up to the World War I era.

Most of the people are living in the Snake river area, but several couples traveled from long distances to attend the picnic. Mr. and Mrs. Don Davis came from San Francisco, Calif.; Mr. and Mrs. Paul Childers registered from Olympia, Wash.; and Mrs. Maude Largent Cosh made the trip from Phoenix, Ariz.
