

City Librarian Lists Latest Additions Of Volumes for Circulation at Library

According to City Librarian Joy Bell, a number of books have been added in recent weeks for circulation at Nyssa library. They include:

"Spirit Lake" by MacKinlay Kantor. The story of emigrant and immigrant, the outlaw's story, the little girl's story, the murderer's story—the story of the dedicated young surgeon, hog-breeder, poetess, religious exhorter, of the Indian woman who harvests her crops in the midst of simmering violence.

"Notes from a Dark Street" by Edward Adler. It is through Yago and his inquisitive explorations of their sorrows, joys, defeats and aspirations that we come to know his neighbors—a Talmudic scholar who has exchanged the inferno of Auschwitz for a never-ending monologue with despair, an Italian dollmaker who has made a harmony of love from his sister's insanity and his father's senility.

"Dragon in the Kremlin" by Marvin L. Kalb. In this penetrating and timely report, Marvin L. Kalb, CBS correspondent in Moscow, brilliantly analyzes the powerful but uneasy partnership that may hold the key to the future of everyone in the free world. Rarely has the West confronted so alarming a combination of ideological, military, political, economic and psychological forces with so pathetically little information.

"One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest" by Ken Kesey. The story of a struggle between a man and woman for the spirits and hearts of a group of people who have been defeated by the world.

"South Sea Islands" by Charles A. Borden. When Theodore Roosevelt declared, "This century will be the century of the Pacific," he could not have foreseen how swiftly events and new methods of travel would bear out his prediction. The American people in increasing numbers will have such an opportunity as has previously been given only a relatively few sailors, missionaries, millionaires and traders to know the wonderful people of Micronesia, Melanesia and Polynesia.

"Adventures of the Mind." First series edited by Richard Thruelsen and John Kobler. In these pages some of the world's most able creative thinkers meet the urgent need to bridge the gulf between the intellectual pioneers of our exciting time and the intelligent layman who cannot keep up with the challenging developments in sciences, the humanities and the arts. This single volume reflects the mainstreams of contemporary thought.

"The Shadow Catcher" by James D. Horan. This is a novel about the trail-blazing journey of the amazing little band of men and women who made their way west to found the first settlement of Americans in the Oregon territory.

"Running a Happy Family" by Henry and Elizabeth Swift. The simple, basic techniques of happy family life are not taught anywhere and most individuals learn them, if at all, late in life after many sorry experiences. Yet to learn them young, when they will serve one best, requires only a little study, reflection and practice.

"Adventures of the Mind." Second series edited by Richard Thruelsen and John Kobler. In these pages 40 eminent intellectual adventurers discuss current concepts and coming problems in the worlds of science, the arts and the humanities. Here is an exciting sample of the ideas that shape our lives and mold our culture—criminal law, science and sex, U. S. presidency, origin of matter and life, creative imagination, Twentieth Century economics and more.

"The Ivy Tree" by Mary Stewart. Mary Grey had come from Canada to the land of her forebears: Northumberland, where Hadrian built his protective wall nearly 2000 years ago. As she leaned against the sun-warmed stones, savoring the ordered, spare beauty of England's northern fell, the silence was shattered by a single name hurled, as it were, like an epithet: "Annabel!"

"Witch Doctor's Apprentice" by Nicole Maxwell. Nicole Maxwell is an amateur explorer and member of the Royal Geographical society who traveled deep into the Peruvian jungle and up the tributaries of the Amazon in search of medicinal plants used by the Indians from time immemorial. This book is the account of her journey.

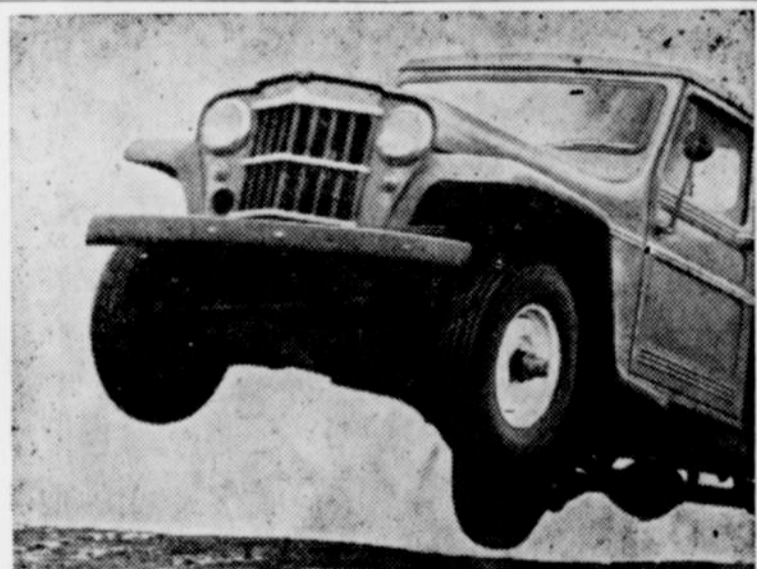
