### Adrian Labor Camp Vaccinations Given, Instruction Offered

Newell Heights—Dr. E. J. Wainwright, county health officer from Ontario; Mrs. Edna Blaylock, nurse from Vale; and Mrs. Mildred Liming, nurse from Nyssa, went to the Adrian labor camp June 20 to give DPT, polio and smallpox vaccinations.

The health workers report they were very pleased with the turnout. They ran out of serum and returned Wednesday of this week to finish giving the injections.

The group will return again in July and August with the last of the shots. This program is sponsored by the Migrant Ministry organization.

Two English classes are held every week at the camp for migrants who cannot speak English. Arithmetic and reading instruction is conducted once a week for those who speak the language. Six girls from the camp report to the high school in Adrian for instruction in sewing. Kay and Marie Borge have charge of this class.

Two thrift sales have been held at the camp and the money has been used to buy athletic equipment for the campsite.

More children's and teenage clothing is needed. Those having articles to give are asked to leave them in the Adrian church basement where a box will be provided.
