Chest x-rays in the unit are free and everyone over 21 is urged to take advantage of this service. Mrs. Kudrna reported that 3,518 x-rays were taken last year in Malheur county and two active cases of TB were found. Heart and lung abnormalities have also been found and all x-ray film is read for these as well as for tuberculosis. Any abnormality discovered is referred to the person's private physician.

Mrs. Kudrna stated, "It is tragic to note that while TB could be eradicated, there are still over 10,000 deaths per year in the United States from tuberculosis. On the basis of current cases, it is predicted that there will be 52 cases of TB in Malheur county by 1969."

Crash Sends Worker To Hospital; Driver Jailed for Assault

Louis Florez Rodriguez, 30, migrant worker living at the Nyssa labor camp, was taken to Malheur Memorial hospital Sunday night with head injuries and multiple fractures of the legs caused when struck by a car near Owyhee junction south of Nyssa.

Manuel Frias Saldana, laborer of the same address, was arrested by local police as driver of the car and charged with hit and run and leaving the scene of an accident.

The two men were reported being in a fight involving three other men near the scene of the accident.

At press time state police said Saldana is now charged on assault with a dangerous weapon. An eye witness said the hit appeared to be deliberate. Saldana is in the county jail in lieu of bond.

Hospital authorities reported Rodriguez in satisfactory condition at press time Wednesday.

Per Capita Income in Oregon Reaches New High; Above National Average

Per capita income in Oregon during 1961 was the highest ever recorded for the state and above the national average for the third consecutive year, reports Mrs. Elvera Horrell, Oregon State university extension agricultural economist.

Last year the state recorded a total personal income of \$4.1 billion or an average of \$2,280 per person. This was a gain of 1960. However, retail prices moved up a little more than one percent, leaving a loss of about \$5 per person in terms of purchasing power.

Oregon's per capita income last year was \$15 above the national average of \$2,265, also a record high, based on reports from the U.S. Department of Commerce, Mrs. Horrell said. Nationally, average per capita income last year varied from a high of \$3,059 in the District of Columbia to a low of \$1,233 in Mississippi. Delaware led all states, excluding the District of Columbia.

Dive From Bridge Into Snake River Claims Life of Henry F. Van Twisk

Body Found Monday 10 Miles Downriver After Intensive Search by Two-State Teams

The body of Henry Van Twisk, 34, Nyssa, was recovered Monday afternoon about 10 miles down Snake river from the Nyssa bridge where he drowned Saturday evening following a jump from the top of the bridge.

Van Twisk left the home of his mother saying he was going swimming at the Nyssa pool and would be back for supper

soon. Evidently he changed his mind as he and Richard Strausbaugh, 35, also of Nyssa, were seen jumping from the north side of the bridge at 8:15 p.m. by some children, Albert Meier and George Smit who live on the Idaho side of the river.

Disappears 70 Feet From Bank Both men surfaced and Strausbaugh swam to shore but Van Twisk went under when about 70 feet away from the bank and did not reappear. The children tried to tell Strausbaugh but he was unable to hear their yells in time to go to the aid of Van Twisk. It is not known if he suffered cramps or might have gotten caught in debris.

Operations to recover the body began within 30 minutes with local divers and boats equipped with grappling hooks dragging the area. Local officers and volunteers were assisted by Canyon county officers and divers.

The search continued until late at night and was renewed again Sunday with six boats covering the area with divers, hooks and patrolling downriver for several miles.

Discovered by Local Men The body was discovered Monday by Orville Maze and Ben Storm at 1:20 p.m. on a sand bar on the Oregon side of the river about 60 feet from the bank. Maze said the river was possibly 600 feet wide at that point and detection would have been difficult from the bank due to density of tree growth.

The location was near the Al Andrews farm at the east end of Oregon avenue. Maze and Storm called to Andrews who notified state police by telephone.

Confused by Marsing Drowning About the same time that Van Twisk was drowned the Boise radio stations were broadcasting that a 24-year-old man had lost his life following a dive from the Snake river bridge at Marsing.

Search operations were in progress there and some local people thought the story on the Nyssa man drowning was in error, but the coincidence was real.

Henry Frederick Van Twisk was born June 7, 1928, near Nyssa, a son of Jacob and Margaretha Vollmuth Van Twisk.

He attended Nyssa schools, was a member of the Lutheran church in Ontario, spent three years with the U.S. Army in Japan and worked as a farm laborer and with construction crews.

Van Twisk was unmarried and lived with his mother on Park avenue.

An active committee composed of Denny Jones of Juntura, Carl Doman of Vale and Howard Larsen of Ontario is studying this aspect of juvenile work and making regular reports to the council.

Need for Shelter Care

In addition to this the juvenile department reported that there is a need for shelter care and detention facilities for dependent children and juvenile offenders. At times the authorities find it necessary to take youth into custody and at present there are no existing facilities to care for them.

The council recommended to the county court that a study be made whereby several private homes could furnish temporary shelter care and detention facilities for dependent children and juvenile offenders and be reimbursed for this service—some of the requirements being toilet facilities, locked doors and 24-hour supervision.

Councilmen Give Unanimous Vote To Nyssa Budget

Nyssa city councilmen met at a special session Thursday evening, June 28, in the council chambers.

According to City Manager Art Colby, Mayor Grant Rinehart opened the meeting at 8 o'clock, as previously advertised, for discussion and any protest of the 1962-63 city of Nyssa budget as published on June 7 and 14 in the Gate City Journal.

There being no one present to discuss or protest the budget, a motion was entertained for adoption of the budget as published.

Subsequent to a brief discussion it was moved to adopt the published budget in the amount of \$237,928 for operation and tax levy, inside levy to be \$36,854.10, serial levy for streets, \$12,320.38 and taxes outside 6 percent as voted for bond principal and interest to be \$22,330.

The latter amount is \$5,491.33 less than the allowable levy for general obligation principal and interest and \$43,618.57 in debt retirement reserve.

The group present voted unanimously to adopt the total budget of \$281,546.58 which includes reserves.

Board Members Set College Tuition Fees

Tuition fees for the new Treasure Valley Community college were set June 27 at a meeting of the board of directors.

For all students living within the district boundaries, basic tuition on a full-time basis was set at \$75 a term or \$225 per year. For those living in Oregon, but outside the boundaries, the fee is \$85 per term, \$255 a year.

Tuition for out-of-state students will be \$130 a term or \$390 per year.

Part-time students will have their tuition prorated according to hours and courses, the board added.
