Nyssa Chapel Rites To Be Held Today For C. W. de Boer

Funeral services for Cornelius William de Boer will be conducted at 10 o'clock this morning, July 5, 1962, at Lienkaemper chapel with the Rev. Howard Larson of Ontario Christian church officiating.

Mr. de Boer was born June 15, 1881, in Schellinkhout, Holland, a son of Pieter and Alida Tensen de Boer. Translated, the name "de Boer" means "the Farmer." He grew up and received schooling in his native country. As a young man he served in the Holland army.

He came to the United States and the Nyssa area in 1902 and began working for Peter and Bill Tensen. In 1909, Miss Harmina Pereboom came to this country from Holland and the couple was united in marriage on Aug. 13 of that year at Arcadia. Also in 1909, they homesteaded a farm northwest of Nyssa, located between the Owyhee and Shoestring irrigation ditches.

In 1918, they left the farm and Mr. de Boer went into the butcher shop business in Nyssa, then into the draying industry and finally returned to farming.

As a young farmer, Mr. de Boer raised prize Holstein dairy cattle and delighted in exhibiting them at the fairs. As he grew older and unable to farm, his favorite hobby was gardening.

Mr. de Boer succumbed Monday morning, July 2, 1962, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Louis (Amalia) Pratt of route 1, Nyssa. His health had failed gradually for the past several years. Mrs. de Boer died Jan. 2, 1953. Their eldest son preceded him in death, having succumbed in infancy.

Mr. de Boer had lived with the Pratts for the past seven years, having visited for about a month twice each year with another daughter, Mrs. Mina Correll at Umatilla.

Among survivors are two sons, Peter of Ontario and Fred of Boring, Ore.; three daughters, Mrs. Pratt, Mrs. Correll and Mrs. Alida Carr of Ontario. Eleven grand-

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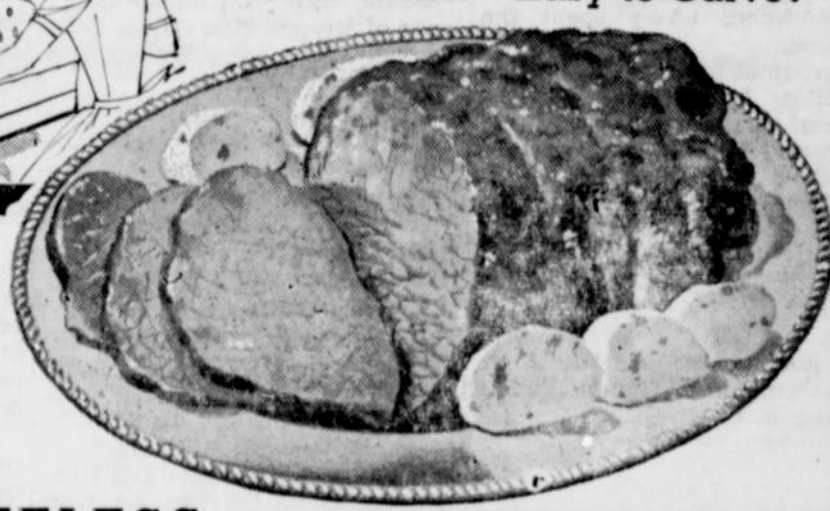
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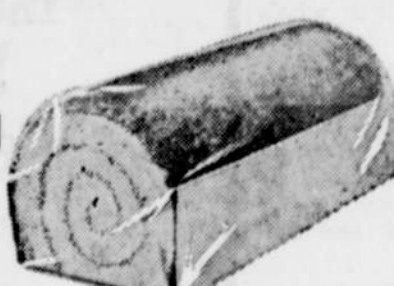
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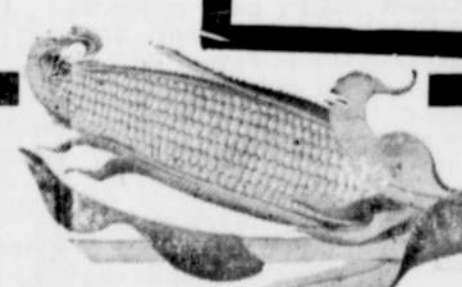
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
