Extensionist Lists Kitchen Gift Ideas For Newlyweds

Planning a shower for a bride? Why not make it a kitchen "wardrobe"—just what the well-equipped cook will need, suggests Bernice Strawn, Oregon State university extension specialist.

Avoid embarrassment of receiving duplicates of some popular items and drawing "blanks" on others, she advises. Start with this basic list from which guests can choose. Two or more can double up on the larger items.

To start housekeeping the bride will need sauce pans with covers in three sizes: 1-pint for reheating leftovers, 1-quart for cooking

vegetables, 2-quart or larger for use when she has guests.

A 3- to 4-quart Dutch oven is useful for stews, whole chickens and spaghetti, says the home economist.

Skillets and fry pans in 8-inch and 10-inch sizes are handy. The larger size should have a lid for frying chicken and skillet meals.

A good coffee maker—percolator, drip or vacuum type—is probably on the bride's list. Type depends on the couple's preferences. An electric one that makes at least four cups at a time is suggested.

For use in the oven a bride can use an 8- or 9-inch pie pan which is also handy for rolls, biscuits and odd jobs. A 9-inch square cake pan is just right for many cake mixes and baked desserts, reminds the OSU equipment specialist. For casserole dishes the 2-quart size in a pretty design is always a pleaser.

Miss Strawn says every kitchen should have a roasting pan about 12 by 9 by 2 inches. Add to this a cookie sheet and perhaps a small tea kettle and the bride will be cooking on all four burners.

For those with limited money to spend for shower gifts consider these items—measuring spoon set, measuring cup, set of four measuring cups, lemon juicer, rotary beater, long-handled fork, narrow spatula or pancake turner.

Eight Ways to Stretch Food Dollars Listed by OSU Extension Specialists

Looking for ways to save money and not feel pinched? As much as \$250 can be trimmed from your family's yearly food bill by shopping more wisely for food which is one of the more flexible items in the budget, say extension specialists at Oregon State university.

"Your family will still eat well—not a depression diet of beans, dried peas and salt-pork," assure Jean Shipman and Barbara McCandless, food marketing specialists at OSU. They offer eight ways a family can save on food.

1. Figure cost per serving when buying meats. A quarter out of every food dollar is spent on meat. Shoppers can afford to pay for twice as much boneless, fully cooked ham than bone-in, uncooked ham. Fully cooked ham has less waste and more servings.

2. Figure cost per unit on other foods. These include rice, cereal, mayonnaise, peanut butter and dried fruit. A pound loaf of enriched white bread that sells for 20 cents costs half as much per pound as an 8-ounce package of enriched white rolls.

Private Labels Offer Savings

3. Look for money-savers under private labels. Canned and frozen foods labeled with less well-known names usually are priced under similar nationally advertised brands. Try various brands to learn quality firsthand.

4. Buy in-season foods. Specialists offer two OSU leaflets, "Fresh Fruits and Vegetables, Availability in Oregon" and "Retail Meat Prices, Monthly Variation on Oregon Markets." Both are free on request at county extension offices.

5. Match quality for use. Buy ripe nectarines, plums, pineapples and bananas at reduced prices for immediate use. Fresh peaches need not be perfect for cobbler and salads, remind home economists. Canned brome pieces cost less than perfect halves or whole fruit.

Although canned tuna is available in fancy or solid pack, chunk, flaked or grated, the solid pack is the most expensive. Solid white meat makes a dressier salad; grated tuna is an inexpensive choice for casseroles, souffles and fish cakes.

Prepared Foods Cost More

6. Enjoy convenience foods but know that you pay for some. Specials on any of these create more favorable prices. Choose those that really save money, reduce waste, preparation or cooking time. Ingredients added at home boost prices on some. Some save time; others don't.

Ready-to-eat cereals may cost four times as much as oatmeal per serving. Potatoes in their various forms may cost anywhere from 2 to 29 cents a serving. Whipped cream in aerosol cans costs more than regular whipping cream.

Money saving foods include nonfat dry milk, cake mixes, frozen orange juice, and white sauce, biscuit and bread mixes made at home.

7. Don't cause waste at the market or at home. Shoppers who
