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Travel Guides to Pacific Northwest Top New Books at Malheur Library

New books going into circulation recently at Malheur county library include the following:

"Official Guide to the Pacific Northwest and Century 21 Exposition" by Sunset magazine. The visitor to the 1962 Century 21 Exposition in Seattle will find this latest in the "Sunset Discovery Books" series useful for travel information about the Pacific Northwest, particularly for Oregon, Washington, British Columbia and the Canadian Rocky Mountain parks.

"Harian's Pacific U.S.A." by Thomas B. Lesure. A travel guide to Hawaii, Alaska, California, Oregon and Washington.

"How My Mind Was Changed," edited by Harold E. Fey. Thirteen Christian writers have each contributed an essay assessing the impact of the last decade on their lives and thought.

"Guiding Superior and Talented High School Students" by Frank S. Endicott. Suggestions for developing a guidance program for able youth.

"The New Age in Physics" by Sir Harrie Massey. A description of 20th-century physics which developed following discovery of the principle of relativity and of quantum mechanics.

"Forth to the Wilderness" by Dale Van Every. A very full, essay-like treatment of the opening, by force, of the Ohio valley to settlement in the two decades before the Revolution.

"Modern Space Science" by Frederick E. Trinklein. A well-organized presentation with many illustrations. The material is arranged in four units: The composition of the universe, the physical laws of space, the geography of space and man in space.

"King John" by W. L. Warren. A reassessment of the reign of King John of England in the light of recent research.

"Yes & No" by Alta Jablow. A collection of African folklore.

"Dear Editor" by Willis Eberman and "Oregon Signatures," edited by Robert Dee Brown. Two books of poetry by Oregon authors.

"The Fox in the Attic" by Richard Hughes. The first volume in a projected series of fictional studies of England and the Continent between the two world wars. This first part gives the effect of an introduction since many characters are seen fleetingly and their problems touched on but not resolved and the political events described — notably the beginning of Hitler's career — are treated in the same way.

"Twilight of Honor" by A. I. Dewlen. A probing novel about a murder trial, a small town caught up in the frenzy of revenge and one man's lonely battle for justice at any cost.

"Herbs" by Helen Noyes Webster. How to grow them and how to use them with a supplement on herbs of the Bible.

"A Feast of Friends" by Rosser Evans. Only after Igor Conrad's death in an airplane crash do his friends discover his true identity and the extent of his powerful, even dangerous, influence on their lives. An interesting plot, lively pace and believable characters make this an effective, highly readable novel set in New York in the 1930's.

"The New Perennials Preferred" by Helen Van Pelt Wilson. A revision of an older book that has been enlarged by about 60 pages of text and new illustrative planting plans.

"The Polly Bergen Book of Beauty, Fashion and Charm" by Polly Bergen. Advice on diet, exercise, rest, hair styles, make-up and clothes by a popular television entertainer.

"Never Tease a Dinosaur" by Joseph F. Hannan. A schoolteacher has his problems and in this book the author gives an hilarious account of some of them.

"The Red Fountain" by Jeanne Montupet. In Algeria in 1837 Simon Vermorel settled at the Red Fountain. After the death of Simon at the hands of the Arabs, his son and his daughter-in-law carry on their struggle against drought, plague and hostile natives to retain the Red Fountain.

"Cactus and the Crown" by Catherine Gavin. A colorful, historical novel set in Mexico during the time of the ill-fated Maximilian and Carlota.

"Pilgrim Strangers" by Charles Mercer. Returning to the setting of his "Rachel Cade," the author has written an entertaining novel which nevertheless gives a timely reflection of contemporary Africa and its problems.

"The Proud American Boy" by Russell Braddon. A novel about an eight-year-old Negro boy accused of rape and the forces that battle for and against him.

"Popes in the Modern World" by Francis Sugrue. The life stories of six men who led the Catholic church into the 20th century.

"English Romantic Poetry" edited by Harold Bloom. A comprehensive selection from the romantic age of English poetry, including such authors as Blake, Byron, Shelley, Keats and Coleridge.
