## Unwrapped Bulk Candies Banned Under State Law

This will be unwelcome news to kiddies who can't resist dipping their chubby hands into those wonderful boxes of unwrapped candies while Mom pushes a grocery cart around the store.

The state department of agriculture has advised its fieldmen working in food stores to start taking enforcement action when they find unwrapped candies in open boxes or barrels.

And the department has informed candy manufacturers and grocers that it will no longer permit sale of unwrapped candies on a self-service basis.

This crackdown comes after almost a year's warning to grocers that bulked candies must be wrapped if they are offered for sale by the self-service route. Any enforcement actions will be taken under the Oregon Food Law.

Manufacturers have turned to the old "cracker barrel" technique of merchandising because they claim they sell more candy this way, declares Kenneth E. Carl, chief of dairy and consumer services.

But this doesn't jibe with modern sanitation practices. In fact, it's conducive to anything but. The department's inspectors reviewed the "candy situation" at their recent conference in Salem.

Said one inspector: "I have reports of kids taking candy from an open box, biting into it and tossing it back." Said another: "One woman complained of candy being picked up from the floor and put back in the box when a mother surprised her child dribbling a handful on the floor."

This type of merchandising reached its peak during the holiday season last year, Carl says.

He declares the department has no quarrel with self-service candies that are individually wrapped. Also, stores will have one "out" in dispensing unwrapped candies from bulk containers. They can move the containers to the check stands where clerks may do the bagging—provided these containers are covered when sales are not being made.

The U.S. Marines are sometimes called "Leathernecks." This originated from the leather stocks which were worn on the collar of their uniform.

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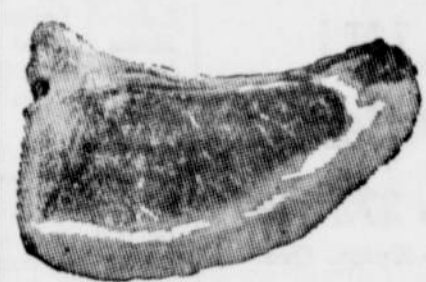
