Only Limited Rural Road Funds Available Without Levy; Curtail Road Equipment Use

In the most lop-sided election ever held in Malheur county, voters in the newly created Road District No. 1 rejected the proposed 10-mill levy Thursday of last week. The vote was 392 against the levy and only 15 for it.

All 15 of the "yes" ballots were cast by voters in the Vale district, and of the "no" votes 233 were cast by those in the

Board of Health Issues Warning On Heat Hazards

Oregon State Board of Health warned this week against the possibilities of sunstroke or heat prostration from overexertion, particularly during periods of hot weather.

Although the two conditions are frequently thought to be the same, they require different methods of handling, according to Dr. Richard H. Wilcox, state health officer.

He said symptoms of sunstroke include a very red face, hot dry skin, no perspiration, labored breathing or sighing, a full and rapid pulse, high temperature and possible muscle spasms.

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Victims should be moved to a cool place immediately and a physician should be called, Dr. Wilcox said. The patient's clothing should be loosened, the body cooled and brisk rubbing should be started to stimulate circulation. Avoid ice packs or baths because they constrict surface blood vessels.

Heat Exhaustion Described

By contrast, Dr. Wilcox said, heat exhaustion usually produces muscular weakness, dizziness, an uncertain or staggering gait, nausea, pale face and profuse perspiration. The pulse is weak, breathing shallow and the victim may become cold even though the air is warmer than body heat.

In the case of heat exhaustion, the patient should lie down in an area with good air circulation and be given a moderate amount of covering, according to the health officer. A level half-teaspoonful of salt in about one-third glass of water may be given repeatedly until as much as a level tablespoon of salt has been taken. Stimulants such as warm coffee or tea may be given and external heat may be needed in severe cases. A physician should always be consulted.

Sunstroke and heat exhaustion can strike anyone, the health officer warned, although serious cases occur most often among alcoholics, young children, elderly people, overweight persons and those suffering from some chronic illness.

Idaho Cannery Enlarges Nyssa Facilities

Canning Firm Adds Large Structure To Nyssa Plant; Crop Outlook Given

Idaho Canning company, home office Payette, is making an extensive addition to the Nyssa factory which will about double present storage space.

The new addition is 240 feet long, 90 feet wide, with 23-foot walls. Construction is concrete and reinforced steel of tilt-up type. Floor is of concrete; roof is standard asbestos supported by arch-type trusses that will give clear floor space without posts. The long way of the building is parallel to the railroad tracks to facilitate loading and unloading.

DeBord Construction company of Payette is contractor of the building, Timber Lam of Ontario has contract for the trusses and roof and the engineering is done by Superior Engineering company of San Francisco.

According to Fred M. Moss, president of the cannery company, additional storage has been needed for some time and with production increasing in the Nyssa area and construction costs continually increasing it was felt it could be done more cheaply now than later. Completion date is set for Aug. 1.

He said additional space was being added to the Payette plant but not as much as to the Nyssa cannery.

Corn crop in good condition.

Moss said field reports show the corn crop is much better now than at this time last year and that price to growers is up somewhat from 1961. Contracted acreage is up slightly, about the same number of employees will be used in processing the crop, but shifts will be longer.

He did not know when processing would start but anticipated it would be later than last year due to the cooler weather.

Experiments are still being carried on at the Payette plant to find a crop that can be grown profitably by farmers of the area and that will permit the company to utilize the plant longer than the few weeks now used in processing sweet corn.

Moss said his company had spent \$75,000 or more on tomato experiments in an effort to find a type that could be adapted to the area. Experiments will be continued until something is found, he said.

Size of the spuds is small, he stated, due to a heavy set on the plants which will cut down on yield this year.

Processing of Early Gems will begin next week with White Rose potatoes coming on the following week.

Market prices have not as yet been established, Eldredge added.

Nyssa School District No. 26 Receives Strong Approval on Third Election Try for Budget; Carries 611 to 207

Figures Accepted Are \$21,051 Lower Than First Budget and \$1202 Below Those of 1961

After rejecting the first two budgets submitted by the school board, voters of district 26, Nyssa, approved the third, Friday, almost three-to-one. Vote was 611 for and 207 against. In the first election, May 7, voters were submitted a budget with \$82,900 outside the 6 percent limitation. This was turned down by a 245 to 178 vote.

The second election was held June 26 and again rejected, 362 to 314, after the board had cut \$2100 from the first budget. Following this denial, the board voted to cut \$21,051 off the original amount and submit a figure that was \$1202 lower than that approved in last year's election.

The 818 voters in the last election represented an increase of 395 over the first election and 142 above the second. This time the "no" votes decreased 155 while the "yes" votes rose 297.

Change Factors Listed

In checking with Superintendent W. L. McPartland, he said the board felt several factors made the change in the vote, among which were:

(1) The increase in numbers voting indicated many "yes" voters turned out for the first time in the three elections, (2) many previous "no" voters did not vote in this election, (3) quite a number of previous voters switched to support this third budget which they felt was pared as much as possible without affecting basic educational requirements.

In the first two elections, electors were checked on clerks' lists but were not asked to sign. At the last they were required to sign the list opposite their printed name. This should have been the requirement in the first two elections, according to Hal Henigson, school attorney. He cited section 250.645 of elections in the Oregon statutes as providing for these conditions.

Other Board Activities Noted

Following an official canvass of the Friday votes, board members reelected for the coming year Warren Farmer as chairman and Dick Tensen, vice chairman.

They voted to sell the old school bus on bids and again ask for bids on the driver training car.

Discussion was held relative to establishing school board policy on the duties of the new clerk-business manager to be hired. Ontario policies were reviewed and McPartland was to check further with other schools which have had similar conditions, when he attends a meeting of school superintendents tomorrow in Eugene.

Rainbow Rooms Raid Saturday Night Brings Arrest of Three Local Women

A state police raid on the Rainbow Rooms, 12 East Main street, Nyssa, Saturday night, July 14, resulted in the arrest of Marion Rena Ditty, owner; her sister, Lola Margaret Gonzales; and Michela Virginia Martin.

Mrs. Ditty and Mrs. Gonzales were charged with operating a bawdy house and Mrs. Martin with a formal charge of vagrancy. The latter was released under \$100 bond and the other two under \$2000 bond each.

Mrs. Gonzales was released in the preliminary hearing before Justice Don Graham Monday afternoon because state was unable to prove she was one of the lessees of the building, as charged in the complaint.

Trial date had not been set for Mrs. Ditty Wednesday at press time. Mrs. Martin, who pleaded not guilty, will be tried Tuesday, July 24, at 2 p.m.

The raid occurred about 10:30 Saturday night and was led by Lt. N. W. Smith of the Baker office of Oregon state police.
