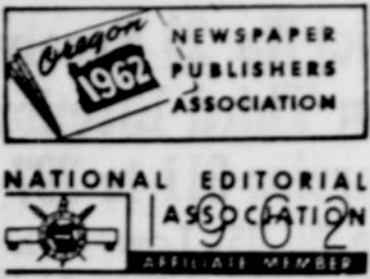

Funeral rites for Howard Verle Pyle were conducted by the Rev. Gerard J. Kuiper of Adrian Presbyterian church Monday morning, July 16, 1962, at Lienkaemper chapel in Nyssa. Mr. Pyle was born June 2, 1906, in Portland, Ore., a son of Henry E. and Evelyn E. Pyle. He made his home for many years with an aunt, Mrs. Frank Johns, now of Adrian. He attended schools in Portland, Arena Valley and Big Bend. In 1926, he joined the U. S. Navy and served for 10 years. He was an electrical worker, having learned the trade while in the service. Mr. Pyle succumbed Thursday, July 12, at the home of his aunt following an extended illness. In addition to Mrs. Johns, he is survived by his widow, Hazel M. Pyle of Adrian; a foster-son, Wayne Birkhead, now in service at Portsmouth, Va., and his mother, Mrs. Evelyn E. Pyle of Los Angeles, Calif. His father preceded him in death. Scientists have recently transmitted picture shows from France and England, through space, to the U. S.; they have probed into the depths of the seas for a distance of almost seven miles; they have sent man through the air around the earth—but our government leaders still can't figure out a workable farm program.

With all the Harvard graduates to advise the president what to do about our declining economic conditions we need not worry that so many of our high school graduates fail to understand what has made America great. If this new system of spending brings prosperity think how much fun we can all have when we start applying it individually. Then we'll all be only too glad to forget the law of "supply and demand."

The New York Daily News, America's largest newspaper, in explaining the proposed 24th (Liberty) amendment says, "The amendment requires that the U. S. government get out of competition with any kind of private enterprise—that no laws or treaties shall weaken the amendment—and that three years after the change's ratification the 16th amendment (federal income tax) shall stand repealed and the government shall cease to levy taxes on personal incomes, estates and gifts."

"This has now been approved by six states—Georgia, Louisiana, Nevada, South Carolina, Texas and Wyoming. If 28 more approve it congress will be legally obligated to call a constitutional convention for the purpose of submitting the proposed change to the state legislatures. Ratification by 34, or 38, of these would nail the amendment into the constitution."

Sounds rather drastic doesn't it? I was rather young when this 16th amendment was passed, Feb. 25, 1913, and can't imagine what it would be like to live under those conditions. And besides who would be big-hearted enough, as individuals, to replace government hand-outs to all those now drawing some type of welfare!
